

Democrats Gain In Registrations

Total registration of the four precincts in Cottage Grove will approximate 1,800 voters, O. O. Veatch, local registrar, announced today. Not all registrations have been made through the office of Mr. Veatch, however, and the scattering registrations will amount to about forty.

Total registrations through the office of Mr. Veatch number 1,759 and by precincts are as follows: Precinct 1—501; precinct 2—480; precinct 3—366; precinct 4—412.

Registration totals from a fourth of Oregon's counties indicated Friday at Salem that the democrats would reduce the 16,000 republican majority of the May primary. Democrats led in the nine counties 29,433 to 27,995, the total registration being 58,324.

Klamath county reported 19,710 registered voters, including 7,529 republicans and 11,877 democrats. The total was 1,100 below the record 1936 general election figure.

Totals for other counties include: Curry, total 2,224, 1,327 republicans, 899 democrats; Harney, total 2,261, 1,059 republicans, 1,180 democrats; Hood River, total 5,389, 2,694 republicans, 2,612 democrats; Lincoln, total 8,575, 4,396 republicans, 4,077 democrats; Morrow, total 2,276, 1,412 republicans, 821 democrats.

Of the counties reporting so far Columbia, Harney, Jefferson and Klamath have democratic majorities, while Curry, Hood River, Lincoln, Morrow and Wasco are listed in the republican column.

COMMITTEE REPORTS AT LIONS CLUB

The program of the Cottage Grove Lions club today noon was taken up with committee reports. Alvin Dugan, high school representative reported the school safety program progressing satisfactorily. Don Greening made a report on the milk fund, stating that this fund had been sponsored by the Eagles lodge in the past. The fund he said needed about \$15. per month to be properly maintained. Several clubs have agreed to contribute to the deficit or the amount the Eagles lodge is not able to contribute. Attention was also called to the annual Red Cross roll call which will be under the supervision of the American Legion Auxiliary. L. C. Schroeder and Lloyd Griggs were appointed as a committee from the Lions club to aid in soliciting funds from the business houses. Lloyd Griggs, local first aid chairman of the Red Cross called attention to the possibility of organizing several first aid classes here and asked members to come out to the meeting at the city hall next Tuesday at which time plans for organization will be discussed by Everett Burden, first aid instructor.

CRAMER TO ADDRESS CHAMBER MEMBERS

Dr. J. F. Cramer, superintendent of the Eugene schools will be the principal speaker at the weekly luncheon of the Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce next Tuesday, H. E. Eakin, president announced yesterday. The subject of Dr. Cramer's address was not announced as he is permitted to speak on any subject of his choosing.

Referring to the visits of chamber members and business men to the grange meetings in adjoining communities, President Eakin has urged those who can possibly attend to do so. He said these visits were one of the surest means of promoting friendly relations between the various communities and would result in closer cooperation for the good of the section.

SILK CREEK FIRST AID CLASS PROGRESSING.

The First Aid class organized at Silk Creek early in September is progressing satisfactorily, reports Everett Burden of Eugene, first aid instructor for the Lane County Red Cross chapter. The class at Silk Creek meets each Sunday night and has eleven adult and nine junior members. The class has met five times and is completing instruction on the proper care of wounds and has learned nearly forty ways of using the triangular bandage and how to control serious bleeding with digital pressure and the proper use of the tourniquet which is always a dangerous instrument and needs to be used with care.

Next week the class will begin respiration. Members are getting enjoyment out of the class as well as learning something of value.

Preparation of Land Underway Next Year's Crop

Preparation of lands for cultivation another year has been the order of the day in many farms the past two or three weeks. Fall plantings of wheat and oats have been made and these crops are up to a good stand on many farms with the coming of fall rains.

The indicated acreage in small grain will be about the same as in former years in this immediate vicinity, according to all available information. Soil building crops such as vetch, clover and alfalfa is on the increase. Two or three varieties of alfalfa are being tried out successfully with the proper liming of the soil.

Fall gardens, where such gardens are planted, are doing well.

Lane County Grand Jury Makes Final Report Last Week

In a final report Friday, the Lane county grand jury in session at Eugene failed to return an indictment against victor Reginato, University of Oregon grid star, in the death of Mrs. W. R. Hall in Eugene on October 1st. Reginato was driving the car that struck down Mrs. Hall while crossing a street in Eugene. Clarence Davis was indicted on a charge of involuntary manslaughter in the death of G. Lester Newman who was killed while hunting deer in the Cascade foothills on September 30.

The jury also failed to find a true bill against Cecil Lehman, charged with involuntary manslaughter in the death of Howard Jones, when Jones was hunting deer near Wendling last month.

Last Thursday the jury returned three indictments. Chas. E. Robinson was indicted on charge of larceny by bailee; Elvin Rust, for failure to support children and larceny by bailee and Theodore Rust for burglary and larceny.

The county jury also indicted two Eugene attorneys, William W. Harcombe and James K. King, Friday and the two were arrested by Sheriff C. A. Swarts Saturday morning. Harcombe indicted on three counts is charged with larceny by bailee of a check of \$800 and with forging two worthless checks. King is charged with false swearing in a suit on October 4th.

Four defendants indicted by the grand jury entered pleas of not guilty before Judge G. F. Skipworth at Eugene Monday. Indicted were: Charles E. Robinson, larceny by bailee, James King, accused of false swearing, Clarence Davis, involuntary manslaughter, and LeRoy Phelps, burglary.
