

Farmers Purchase Sodium Chlorate to Kill Noxious Weeds

Sixty-six Lane county farmers purchased a total of 13,000 pounds of sodium chlorate for use on Canada thistles through the Lane county court last week. This is part of a lot of 15,000 pounds that the county court obtained in cooperation with the State Department of Agriculture and is made possible by a law enacted and an appropriation made by the last session of the state legislature. The county court reserved 2,000 pounds for use on county roads and other county-owned land.

The total cost of the sodium chlorate is \$7.50 per hundred F. O. B. Portland and 25c per hundred is being added for freight. Where the sodium chlorate is used on privately owned land, as on farms, the farmer buying the sodium chlorate pays two-thirds of the total cost, plus freight from Portland, or \$5.25 per hundred pounds. Where the sodium chlorate is used on county owned land and on county roads, the county pays one-half of the cost and the State Department of Agriculture pays one-half. Farmers using part of this chlorate have agreed to use it in accordance with the recommendations of the Oregon Experiment Station.

Distribution of the chlorate to farmers was handled by O. S. Fletcher, county agent. Under the terms of the agreement between the county court and the State Department of Agriculture, Mr. Fletcher will visit each farm to see that the chlorate was used in accordance with their agreement. F. D. Petzold, county thistle control supervisor, will have charge of spreading the 2,000 pounds of chlorate reserved by the county for roads and other county land. Farmers knowing of Canada thistle growing on such land are requested to notify Mr. Petzold, whose address is route 5, Eugene.

Lane County Budget Committee Opposed To Salary Increase

The Lane county budget committee has turned down all requests for salary increases in no uncertain terms, but despite their frugality were \$1,531 over figures in the 1938 budget when they halted deliberations for the week end, with the biggest items yet to come.

The county assessor's budget went up \$1700 to \$15,544 to pay for an additional clerk; the county clerk's budget was reduced \$654 to \$22,071; the district attorney's was reduced \$30 to \$3,922; and the county club agent's went up \$30 to \$2,027.

Maintenance of the Lane fairgrounds was upped \$225 to \$4,975, but the levy will be \$2,225, an increase of \$1,325, because of depleted resources. Levy for the county school fund will be \$177,710, members decided, an increase of \$5,300.

The committee threatened to reduce employees' traveling expenses from 5 cents per mile to 4 cents, claiming that tax-free gasoline available at the county barn would allow such reduction. Action on that, too, was postponed.

Also delayed was an inquiry into the county health unit's expenses. Snellstrom questioned the accomplishments of the health service, and the committee decided to confer with health officers later.

Another county fair was assured as the committee planned for a budget of \$14,450, an increase of \$1000. Reduced income for the fair will make it necessary, however, for the county to raise \$8,350, an increase of \$3,910 over the county's share last year.

The committee balked at increasing the fair manager's salary from \$800 to \$1,000, but granted increases in: a museum \$1,500 to \$1,750, advertising \$500 to \$750, racing \$1,800 to \$2,100, insurance \$250. Light and water expenditure was set at \$1,000 instead of \$1,500.

Departmental budgets tentatively approved:

Advertising \$3,400, increased \$1,100 in anticipation of tax sales; county agent \$2,000, as in 1938; auditing \$550 as in 1938; bounties \$1800 as in 1938; corner \$1110 as in 1938; circuit court \$15,000, increased \$3,000 in anticipation of jury expenditures.

County court \$8,000 as in 1938; care of courthouse \$6,850, reduced \$2,080; district sealer, \$600 as in 1938; elections, \$5,000, reduced \$9,000; emergency \$10,000 as in 1938; fire patrol, \$4,000; increased \$1,000; fruit inspector, \$2,500 increased \$500; fair budget, \$14,450, increased \$1,000.

Home demonstration agent \$1,000 as in 1938; indigent soldiers \$1500 as in 1938; care of insane \$500 as in 1938; justice court \$2500 as in 1938; predatory animals \$850 as in 1938; school superintendent office \$5,787.50, increased \$575 to purchase new mimeograph machine.

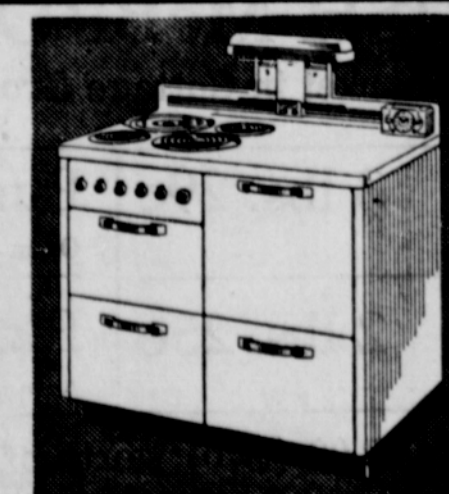
