

Grove Lions Swamp Sweet Home 25-0

The Cottage Grove Lions annexed their third victory in four starts when they swamped the Sweet Home eleven 25-0 at the latter city Friday. The victory gave the Grovers an inside track on the B title of the Greater Willamette Valley league.

While Sweet Home held the visitors on fairly open terms during the first quarter they remained in their own backyard most of the afternoon, threatening only once—late in the third period on a long pass. Coach French's Lions scored twice in the second period, and added touchdowns in each the third and fourth quarters.

After playing most of the opening quarter between mid-field and the Sweet Home 35, the Lions opened the scoring early in the second quarter when Bennett Newton, left halfback, took a reverse and skirted right end behind fine blocking for 40 yards and a touchdown. Newton's pass for extra point was incomplete.

Fullback Patton set up the second tally when he kicked off of bounds on the Sweet Home 5-yard stripe. A return punt was high, but only to the 13-yard line. Davenport and Patton took the ball to the 4 on two plays from where Dugan knifed off right end for the score. Spies' try for point failed.

Early in the third period Sweet Home's fullback, Huffman, broke away for a 30-yard gallop, but was brought down in mid-field by Bud McCoy.

Soon afterward Davenport set up the third counter with a 30-yard run around left end behind excellent interference. He was hauled down on the Sweet Home 13. Patton advanced 8 and then crashed center from the 5-yard line for the touchdown. Newton's

place kick made the count 19-0. Sweet Home's most serious threat came late in the period when Watters heaved a pass to Galloway for a 35-yard gain, the halfback being dropped by Substitute Booher on the Grove 25-yard line. But the Lions held.

The final frame saw lots of substitutions. Hendricks recovered a Sweet Home fumble on the 35. And on the second play, Spies faded back from his end post to toss a pass to Norton for the final score.

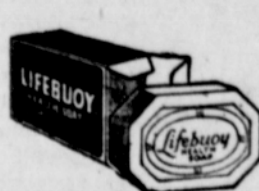
