

Western Nut Men Arrange Meeting In Eugene Dec. 8

The annual winter meeting of the Western Nut Growers association has been set for Eugene, Thursday and Friday, December 8 and 9, announces C. E. Schuster, federal nut specialist at O.S.C. and secretary of the association.

The opening day of the convention will be a joint session with the Oregon State Horticultural society, which will be completing its annual meeting in Eugene that day. The annual banquet is also set for Thursday night.

Irrigation, fertilizers and other topics of interest alike to fruit and nut growers will occupy most of the Thursday program, with a "talkie" on irrigation to be shown by Arthur S. King, extension soil conservationist at O.S.C. Another feature will be a talk by F. L. Ballard, vice-director of the extension service, on "Oregon's Changing Agriculture."

On the Friday morning program are listed a progress report on filbert insect control by B. G. Thompson, O.S.C. entomologist; a preliminary outline for the study of filbert insects by the U.S.D.A., given by S. M. Dohanian, associate federal entomologist, and a report on a promising new copper spray for the control of walnut blight, by P. W. Miller, associate pathologist, U.S.D.A.

The annual business meeting is set for 1:30 o'clock, followed by a talk on marketing the Pacific coast walnut crop under a unified program, by W. E. Goodspeed, Los Angeles, manager of the Walnut Control board. Other speakers will be either Harry Eustace of San Francisco, or Ray Miller of Linden, California, and W. G. Brown of Portland.

The usual exhibits of nuts and nut products will be on display again this year, but the only awards offered this year will be ribbons, Mr. Schuster says. The women will again compete with cakes, candies, cookies and other products using nut meats.

CLOVER SEED PRODUCTION HIGH

Hillsboro—Ladino clover seed production reached a new high in Washington county this year. The yield from 104 acres of ladino totaled 10,033 pounds of clean seed, according to W. F. Cyrus, county agent. One field of red clover of 8.8 acres is also reported to have yielded heavily, producing 7,457 pounds of clean seed. A hay crop of three tons per acre had been cut from the field in June.

Facts for Drivers

The average driver probably doesn't drive his car backward one mile for every 10,000 miles he drives it forward, yet this fact does not make backing an unimportant operation. When it is necessary to back for some distance, many drivers discover that through lack of practice they are incapable of doing so with any degree of competence.

Backing through curves is one of the operations taught at safe driving schools conducted by the secretary of state, and these classes have revealed a wide divergence in the eye-to-muscle coordination necessary in backing. Diligent practice has been found the only way to perfect the art of backing, even for persons whose coordination rates high.

The experienced driver never starts his car in reverse until he is sure his path is clear and that the movement can be completed in safety. On narrow roads especially where there is a drop-off on one or both sides, he usually gets out of his car to inspect the path he wishes to take. He also does this when parked in cramped quarters, rather than risking a crumpled fender.

He starts his car slowly and works the steering wheel fast. In this way he keeps the number of backing movements to the minimum, since he gets the greatest possible advantage out of the position of the front wheels.

There have been several cases in Oregon in which a driver backed over and killed a child playing behind the car, simply because the driver failed to note whether his path was clear.

TO DISCOURAGE THEFT OF LIVESTOCK.

Every effort is being made by the Lane county sheriff's office to help farmers and poultry raisers to discourage stock and poultry thieves from operating in the county. Several reports of losses by theft have been made the past few weeks.

This is the time of the year when livestock and poultry are in condition to market and are very convenient for the night prowler. Every interested person should do

all he can to assist the officers in discouraging these losses and to assist in the detection of the thief.

An announcement from the sheriff's office said: "To assist in this effort let us encourage you to brand or mark your livestock with a recorded brand. Be sure your brand is properly recorded with the state department of agriculture, otherwise it is not a legal brand or mark."

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
