About Willamette Valley Project

To everyone Interested in the Willamette River Basin Project:

Following the great political windstorm, which prevailed all over the state of Oregon on November 8th, we made a trip through the Willamette Valley to look over the fences, etc., to see whether the blast of political winds had done any damage to our project just as people always do following a severe storm. We found the storm had not only left our project intact but had provided material that will make it possible for us to strengthen.

The election results both for state offices and federal can be expected to give our project 100 percent support. Senator McNary and both Congressman Mott and Congressman Pierce reelected were in congress at the time we received authorization. Senator. elect Holman and Congressman elect Angell can be depended upon to make a united Oregon delegation. Governor elect Sprague can be depended upon to give the Willamette Project the same kind of active support given it by our present Governor Martin. Officials of our organization will be able to handle the work necessary before congress with the knowledge of your support behind them.

As to the activities necessary in our own state your officials need the support of you and every other individual in the Willamette valley, who are interested in this vitally important project!

The most important step to be taken in Oregon is to have a Willamette River Basin Project commission set up by our state legislature, which convenes in January. We ask that each of you receiving this letter treat it in an individual capacity and that you contact members elected to the legislature from your county either personally or by letter and let them know of your great interest in the project and desire for their support in the plan to form the commission mentioned above. If you are personally acquainted with other members of the legislature outside your county a letter to them also requesting their support will be helpful. We anticipate practically 100 per cent support, but we want to leave no stone unturned, and we are hoping for the earliest possible action by the legislature. Upon our state action will depend what favorable action we can secure in congress!

You will note we are now using as a title the project title given in the authorization passed in congress, to-wit: The Willamette River Basin Project rather than Willamette Valley Project, the name formerly used. We feel that it will be much better if we follow the use of the project name as it is known nationally.

In order that we may know whether the individuals, to whom this letter is addressed, have done their part and in some way contacted their members of the State Legislature, we will ask that you also write us at 824 S. W. 5th Avenue, Portland, Oregon, so that we may know this matter has been taken care of.

Interested individuals and organizations have raised sufficient funds to carry on the work up to at least May first, but after that date we must have assistance from the state or some agency so we will be in position to complete the work.
