

Nut Growers Are Ready for Meet

New discoveries of science in the field of horticulture will be featured on the programs of the fifty-third annual meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural society and the twenty-fourth annual meeting of the Western Nut Growers' association, sessions of which will both be held in Eugene the second week in December.

The Horticultural society meeting will be December 6 to 8, inclusive, while the nut growers will meet December 8 and 9, with last day of the horticultural session and the first day of the Nut Growers' meeting being conducted jointly. Among the reports on recent investigations to be heard at the horticultural meeting will be developments in the frozen food industry, new varieties of small fruits for Oregon, new methods of pest control and latest developments in both production and marketing practices. The nut growers will hear considerable about irrigation and fertilization, the control of troublesome nut insects and disease, and will also devote a half day to marketing problems.

A feature of the Nut Growers session will be the usual annual nut exhibit, with first, second and third prize robbins to be awarded for best displays of nuts and for best displays of foods and recipes using nut meats.

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Mills Operate at 55.8 Per Cent

Seattle, Washington. — A total of 151 down and operating mills in Washington and Oregon, which reported to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending November 19, 1938, produced 88,143,064 board feet of lumber. At the rate of cutting at the reporting mills, the entire industry produced 55.8 per cent of its average weekly cut during 1927-1929.

The new business reported taken last week by the 151 mills was 91,589,547 board feet. Shipments were 81,273,923.

The unfilled order file at these mills stood at 255,517,632 board feet.
