News Briefs

LOS ANGELES—Mrs. Lillian Volstad of this city was convicted of manslaughter in court here Monday. She will be sentenced December 20. Mrs. Volstad had opposed an operation for her son Frances, who died from peritonitis, following an attack of appendicitis. The Rev. Wilbur Alvis, co-defendant, who prayed for the recovery of the boy, was acquitted but denounced by the court.

OLYMPIA, WASH.—Dr. Kent W. Berry and three co-defendants; Wm. McAloon, former Montesano marshal; James Reddick, driver of the kidnap car; and Robert Smith, convicted of kidnaping and assault by an Olympia jury, and facing life imprisonment, will ask for a new trial, it was announced here Monday. All were convicted following the abduction and torture of Irving W. Baker, Olympia automobile dealer and former coast guard officer.

LOS ANGELES—Duke University of Durham, N. C. has been selected to meet the University of Southern California in the annual Rose Bowl football game January 2. Duke, untied and unscored upon, made 107 points in eight games this season.

CORVALLIS, Ore.—N. C. Donaldson, state executive AAA officer, announced yesterday that Oregon farmers who have overseeded their 1939 wheat acreage allotments may comply with these allotments if they dispose of excess acreage before December 15. This provision was provided mainly to aid farmers who completed fall seeding before their acreage allotments were established finally.

Wheat acreage on farms on December 15 or seeded after that date will be acreage used in determining liability for parity payments, as well as agricultural conservation payments, according to Donaldson.

Railroads serving the strike closed Chicago union stockyards yesterday placed an embargo on livestock consigned to members of the Chicago livestock exchange.

A nation wide strike in France came to an end at midnight last night according to word from Paris, France. Premier Daladier stated the government's victory will show the totalitarian nations that democracy can survive. No serious loss of life was reported.

About 100 delegates to the National Grange meeting in Portland were granted the 7th degree at the national grange meeting in Portland last week. Opposition was expressed to the administration's farm bills. The national meeting at Portland passed resolutions recommending the abandonment and consolidation of unprofitable railroad lines. The grangers frowned on government ownership of railroads and urged completion of the St. Lawrence seaway and the adoption of uniform traffic regulations.

Dr. N. W. Dow of Springfield has called a meeting in Springfield on December 8th to discuss the merger of nineteen high school districts. The proposed merger would involve districts located in the McKenzie district down as far as Springfield.

A Los Angeles woman, Mrs. Mildred Gross, who died Friday from an overdose of sleeping powder, was revived and died a second time. She was revived through the use of picrotoxin, a new chemical used in making explosives.

The Oregon state highway department will attempt to swell the tide of tourists to the Golden Gate exposition next year with an increase of \$20,000 in the publicity budget, making in all \$120,000 appropriation for publicity purposes.

Counting fish has been a popular past time at the fish ladders at Bonneville dam. A partial government fish census released Friday revealed that 1,074,617 fish have passed over the "flash boards" the past six months.
