Rites for John M. McDonald, aged 62, were held from the Mills Chapel Tuesday afternoon with the Rev. E. L. Kechley, Christian church minister, officiating. Following the funeral services the body was shipped back to Athens, Ohio, former home of the deceased, where burial was made.
