

New Type Highway Suggested for State

The new type of highway, known as "freeway," already adopted in more advanced states and in Europe, should be made possible in Oregon by legislation as the most important means of meeting the constantly mounting death toll from motor accidents, it is declared in a report, "Freeways for Oregon," just issued by the Oregon State Planning board. The report, which goes into detail on the present condition of highway traffic in Oregon, was prepared by the advisory committee on roadside protection, of which John B. Yeon, Portland, is chairman.

New highways have been built and old ones rebuilt in Oregon at great public expense to provide safe transportation arteries to meet the constantly changing and increasing demands of traffic, yet the hazards of travel remain, the report declares.

The "freeway," suggested for Oregon is literally a free right of way. Along a freeway there are no intersections with other roads except those provided by the public road-building agency. Under the present system the owners of abutting property have right of access to or egress from the thoroughfare. Along a freeway access is considered only at the provided junctions. The designation of freeways in Oregon should be limited to those routes intended for heavy arterial use, the report makes clear.

Until freeways are made possible for Oregon by legislation, highway authorities believe, the state will be forced to continue to spend vast sums on the construction of highways which are known to be obsolete while they are still being planned. The continued construction of roads, proved hazardous by past experiences, will increase the already appalling death list on the present highways.

News Briefs

Seven new laws went into effect in Oregon Saturday by the proclamation of Governor Chas. Martin. The laws, of far reaching importance, provided for the regulation of picketing and boycotting by labor organizations; examination of both men and women applicants for marriage licenses to prove their physical fitness to wed; approval of two anti-gambling bills aimed at slot machines referred to the electorate by the 1937 legislature; stream purification; a 20-day period in which the governor can decide whether or not to veto any measure after adjournment of the legislature and an order directing the legislature to ask congress to call a constitutional convention to adopt the Townsend old-age pension plan.

D. E. Nickerson, executive secretary of the Oregon state federation of labor Saturday requested a complete list of individuals and firms, who contributed to aid the passage of the anti-picket bill, approved by the voters November 8th.

Governor-elect Sprague assured the Oregon State Game commission Friday night he had no intention of changing the personnel of the board.

Thirty-five hundred Oregon people are said to have signed a petition addressed to the immigration officials at Washington, D. C., protesting the deportation of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gong for the alleged illegal entry into this country in 1922. Deportation would separate the Gongs from their five children.

The U. S. Treasury announced Friday a deficit of \$1,436,000,000 for the first five months of the fiscal year.

Thirty-six ships harbor-bound because of a storm began moving out of the mouth of the Columbia river and Coos bay region Saturday, as storm signals along the Washington - Oregon coast line came down. Meanwhile heavy snows fell in the higher regions, particularly the McKenzie pass.

A new estimate of the unemployed of this country, 10,569,000, was made at Washington Saturday by Leon Henderson, government economist. It is estimated that the nation would still have 5,900,000 on the unemployed basis of these figures, had there been no depression.

Salt Lake City, Utah. — Funeral services were held Sunday and Monday for 23 school children and Farrell Silcox, bus driver, victims of Utah's worst motor-train crash, who died when a school bus was struck by a fast Denver and Rio Grande Western freight train, during a snow storm. The bus driver stopped at the crossing, witnesses agree, but failed to see the approaching train. The children were enroute to Jordan district junior high school near Midvale, 12 miles south of Salt Lake City. Sixteen children in the rear of the bus escaped with minor injuries.

Seattle, Wash.—Climbing from an elevation of 5000 feet to 8000 feet with a gross weight of 82,500 pounds, the giant 74-passenger Boeing clipper built for inauguration of Pan-America's projected trans-Atlantic service, last week established a new unofficial world's record. The feat was accomplished with the plane's left outer engine out of service and the ship was still climbing at 50 feet a minute when the test was halted. It was one of a series of tests being conducted under direction of the civil aeronautical

authority preliminary to licensing of the plane.

The fate of Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith, noted aviator, a mystery for two years, was reported solved with the discovery on Aye island, near Burma, of airplane fabric tangled in tree tops at the ocean edge. The fabric was identified as being from Kingsford-Smith's plane. Aye island was not on the maps two years ago.

Ocean spray was thrown more than 300 feet Friday, during the Oregon coast storm. According to Dahl Kirkpatrick, supervisor of the Siuslaw national forest, rangers driving on the coast highway above Sea Lion caves, reported that tremendous waves bounding against the rocks below, threw spray over the road. It is 319.4 feet from the cliffs along the highway straight down to the water.
