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Cultivation Most Practical Way to Eradicate Weeds

Cultivation is by all means the most practical and economical method of eradicating deep-rooted perennial weeds on large areas, in the opinion of L. E. Harris, assistant agronomist of the experiment station, who has been in charge of the research on the control of noxious weeds made possible by a special legislative appropriation.

The report on the weed research will be part of an extensive preliminary report soon to be published covering all of the special agricultural investigations ordered by the last legislature.

In his progress report, Harris points out that important findings in the use of cultivation and smother crops for the control of perennial weeds have been made as a result of the recent research. Valuable work has also been done with chemical control of weeds, which is important under certain conditions, but the recent investigations show most promise for cultural control on large areas.

Contrary to earlier belief, the recent tests have shown that it is unnecessary to begin cultivation of perennial weeds with the first spring emergence. Instead, first cultivation may be delayed until the plants approach the bloom stage. It was also discovered that the roots are depleted as rapidly by delaying cultivation eight to ten days after each emergence as when the cultivation is done immediately upon emergence. This will decrease the cost of eradication more than half, the investigators believe.

In measured tests of root volume in cultivating Canadian thistle it was found that the total weight of roots was reduced from 7334 pounds per acre to 302 lbs. where plots were cultivated six or seven days after each emergence. Deep cultivation in the fall with the use of smother crops was found to give a big advantage in the control of morning glory, a weed which is very susceptible to shading. Corn and sunflower plots proved the effectiveness of using cultivated crops for Canadian thistle control. Five cultivations of corn and three of sunflower plots kept the weeds in check.

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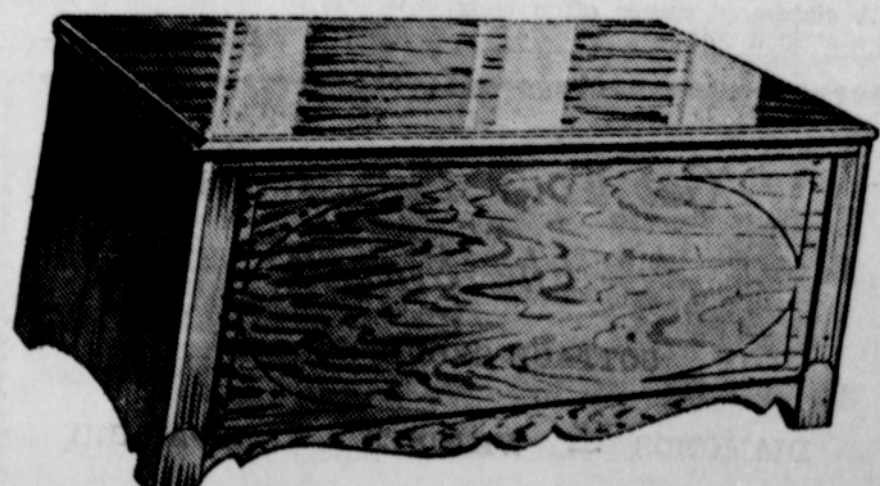
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
