LOCAL SAFETY COUNCIL PLANS EDUCATIONAL SAFETY CAMPAIGN

Plans for an educational safety campaign were made at the meeting of the Cottage Grove Safety Council Tuesday night. The group plans to hold a program of educational classes in the city schools, outlining safety measures, observance of traffic laws and ordinances, stressing especially safety measures to prevent bicycle accidents. The group also will carry on an educational campaign through the newspapers. Plans for the campaign were outlined by H. B. Ferrin, chairman of the education committee.

The safety council passed a recommendation asking the city council to tag bicycles as a means of identification as well as a means of preventing loss. It was cited that other cities license bicycles and recently a bicycle stolen in Grants Pass was recovered here by means of the Grants Pass license tag.

It was voted to ask the city council to place reflector street signs indicating the city speed rate on east and west Main streets and Sixth streets.

The council pointed out that the state highway signs indicating the speed limit for traffic in the city at the north and south highway entrances to the city are placed several blocks within city limits and the group voted to request the state highway commission to place these signs at the city limits. The state highway commission also will be requested to place signs within the school zones, indicating the speed limits for these zones.

James A. Smith, president of the safety council, told how uniforms for the school safety patrol members had been secured through the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce and that efforts are underway to secure Sam Browne belts and uniform caps for patrols to wear on clear days. The present uniforms, designed for rainy weather, consist of white raincoats and white sou'wester hats.

January 10 was set as the next meeting date of the council.

A return practice game with Creswell is planned and other such games will be booked.

Coach Don Moore of the local high school has a squad of 25 practicing at the present but plans to cut this number to 15 before the start of the season. He is having to build his team from the ground up, having lost all of his veterans by graduation. He has some promising material that gives hope of shaping into a winning combination.

Cottage Grove will open its regular season January 6 with a game with Eugene high school on the local floor.

Central School Notes

A unit of study "Living in Colonial America" was concluded Friday, December 3rd by the fifth grade. Thirty-two parents called on that day to view the results of their study. In this unit of study the children experienced and relived life as it was in the days of Colonial America. The outstanding feature of this study was the construction of a log cabin and the furniture used in the cabin. Clothing, curtains, dishes, etc., of the period was made by the girls of the class. Besides the acquiring of a great deal of factual material an appreciation and understanding of Colonial times and changes in the ways of living has been gained by the pupils.

He explained simply the workings of the postal department and answered questions of the pupils regarding the post office and its service.
