### MOTHERS CLUB DOES OUTSTANDING WELFARE WORK

One of the clubs of Cottage Grove whose good deeds go mostly unheralded but which is always ready in time of need is the Mothers club. A Sentinel reporter was prompted to investigate the activities of this organization and was amazed to find the scope and reach of this band of faithful workers in the welfare field of this city.

The reporter asked one of the members to summarize some of the work that the group has carried on and this partial list shows some of the good deeds accomplished during the 18 years the club has been organized: Given to the needy more than 9150 garments, 300 pairs of shoes, 58 quilts, 230 hats, 130 coats, suits, sweaters, baby supplies, quilts and toys; donated many other useful things including groceries, fruits, dishes and furniture; sewed for the Red Cross; contributed \$75 to the community chest; answered many other requests where help was needed. This is but a small part of the work of the club and much more could be said of the aid given by the club.

The demand for public assistance is always present and the Mothers club is always ready to respond. Need is more pressing at this season of the year and the club is handling a large share of the load.

Recently the city council granted to the club the use of a room at the city hall for storage space and work room. Members of the club are especially grateful for this as it will facilitate their work.

The club expressed appreciation of the help and assistance given them in their work by various persons and hoped that those who have clothing or other supplies to give to the club for their welfare work will leave these donations with Mrs. Rosa Curin at 231 south Sixth street.

The Mothers club is strictly a charitable organization and is an asset to the town and community. Mrs. L. McAvoy, now deceased, was the first president.
