Child Dies in Auto Wreck Near Eugene

Ramona Thomason, 5, of Klamath Falls, died Monday morning in a Eugene hospital, as a result of injuries received when the sedan driven by her father, Romie Thomason, struck the side wall of the underpass south of Springfield on the main highway, and turned over.

Four others of the car's six passengers sustained injuries of varying degree of seriousness, Thomason being the most severely injured.

The other passengers were W. W. Whiting and wife and daughter, and Thomason's wife, all of Klamath Falls. Whiting had head lacerations; his wife and Thomason's wife were suffering from shock and minor bruises, and the other little girl was uninjured.

Whiting said Thomason told him later that the throttle on the car stuck as it was entering the underpass, and that in an attempt to remedy the condition, Thomason had applied the emergency brake, causing the car to skid.

Whiting is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Thomason.

It's Open Season For Resolutions; Made Yours Yet?

CHICAGO.—It's again time for New Year's resolutions and psychologists have something to say about it.

"Humbly," is the comment of Dr. Robert N. McMurray, executive secretary of the Chicago Psychological corporation.

"He's wrong," answers Dr. George W. Crane, noted psychologist with Northwestern university.

Although most scientists admit the average resolution lives no longer than a May fly, they claim this old American habit does have merit. Dr. McMurray sees no more logic in using the first day of January for making resolutions than in the old southern custom of shooting off fireworks at Christmas, but he admits

that people most meticulous about their obligations are more likely to keep New Year's promises.

"A good resolution," he says, "becomes a compromise solution to the conscience conflict. The man who makes one says to himself, 'I will make a resolution not to do this or that which I should not during the forthcoming year.' Although it's not the same as refraining from such actions, it does have some value in quieting the conscience's reproaches."

But Dr. Crane is more hopeful.

"It is wise to make resolutions," he says, "since the first step in progress of any sort consists of formulating the plans."

For those without sins to expiate, he suggests the following ideas:

"Pay a sincere compliment to your wife or husband, your children or neighbors.

"Don't wait for death to tear the selfishness from your eyes, after which, in remorse, you heap extra bouquets on the coffin.

"Resolve now to pay at least three sincere compliments every day in 1939."

Unfortunately, there are no statistics on the number of accidents caused by one-armed drivers, but the fact that many such accidents have been caused is undeniable.

Love is only one of many things which take a person's mind and eyes off his driving, but all have the same result — accidents. The driver will make it an ironclad rule to keep his hands on the wheel, his eyes on the road, and his mind on his driving, according to Secretary Snell.
