FUTURE FARMERS PLANT GRASS

The demand for grass seed and the need for improving pasture land has stimulated many Future Farmers to plant from one to three acres of some variety of grass as part of their home project program. Several varieties are being planted which include Crested Wheat, Chewing's Fescue, Tall Fescue, Creeping Red Rescue, Tall Oats, Orchard and Reed Canary grasses.

Chewing's Fescue seems to be the most popular in the Willamette valley. Eleven Lebanon boys under the direction of the instructor, Ira H. Forrey, have each planted from one-tenth to two acres of Chewing's Fescue. In most instances the seed was broadcasted last fall on Olympic (Red Hill) and Dayton low land soils at the rate of ten pounds to the acre. Two plantings were made on the better type of Willamette soil.
