AVERAGE STUDENT AT U. O. JUST OLD ENOUGH TO VOTE.

University of Oregon, Eugene—The average student at the University of Oregon is now just about old enough to vote, statistics revealed by Dr. Earl M. Pallett, registrar, show. The average of the 3334 regular students at the start of school three months ago was 20.8 years.

Freshmen students, as might be expected, average youngest, with men at 19 years and women 18.1. Sophomore men average 20.9 years, exactly one year more than sophomore women at 19.9. The age gap closes up at the junior year, with both men and women averaging 21.2. In the senior class men average 23 and women 22.4. Men in professional schools average 23.3 years, and women 20.5.
