Tremendous Trifles

TINY URGE, GREAT
ADVENTURE

THROUGHOUT his boyhood Randall McDonald listened to the sailors' tales of Japan and made up his mind to go there.

So, on a June day, 1848, he sat in a small boat rolling in the wake of the whaler Plymouth, off the northernmost coast of Japan. He had arranged with Capt. Lawrence B. Edwards to be set adrift when the Plymouth approached the shore.

On July 2, near the village of Notsuka, McDonald capsize the boat deliberately, feeling sure that no race would mistreat a shipwrecked sailor. But he was imprisoned for ten months. He put in his time to good account, however, learning their language and teaching them English.

McDonald was freed from captivity on April 6, 1849. His adventure bore fruit in a strange way. One of his pupils was a youth named Moriyama who became interpreter for Townsend Harris, the first minister from the United States to Japan. Harris' task was one of the most difficult in the history of American diplomacy. The trail that McDonald had blazed into Japan resulted in the rise of an Oriental nation to a world power.

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Many Killed in Draft Riots

News Briefs

The senate democrats at Washington Saturday reelected Sen. Alben Barkley of Kentucky as the majority leader for the 76th congress.

Ninety-one thousand people at Pasadena, California, witnessed a hair-raising finish in the annual Rose Bowl classic and the Southern California eleven emerge victorious by a seven to three score. The seven points of Southern California were made in the last thirty-three seconds of play.

The holiday death toll passed the 200 mark on the first of the new year. As usual auto mishaps accounted for the major part of deaths.

Former Governor Frank Murphy of Michigan Tuesday took office as attorney general of the United States. Murphy succeeds Homer S. Cummings of Connecticut.

Tom Mooney, California's famous prisoner, who has been in prison twenty-two years for his conviction of a 1916 San Francisco preparadness bombing, will be pardoned by Governor C. L. Olson Saturday, it was announced at Sacramento Tuesday.

Oregon listed two dead, Washington five, and northern California fourteen as the holidays took its death toll.

Elizabeth McMahan, Eugene nurse was killed at Eugene last Thursday when a colt she was riding shied and ran under the wheels of a truck driven by John B. Safford, also of Eugene. Miss McMahan sustained a crushed head and chest by the fall of the animal.

Right of way for the Bonneville power through the Willamette valley was cleared Thursday by a court order from Federal Judge James Alger Fee at Portland. Prospects are that the power line will reach Eugene by early autumn.

Oregon's share of the new CCC quota for January will be 2.0, it was learned Saturday. The national enlistment for the period will be 50,314 junior members and war veterans.

Plans to log 500,000,000 feet of timber from the Dusenberry logging tract, the largest logging tract project ever started in Lake county got underway Saturday with the incorporation of the Lakeview Logging Co. Actual logging operations will begin in the spring.
