He told a Sentinel reporter Saturday he had made no plans for the future and planned to rest up awhile before making any decision as to the occupation he might pursue. His successor Judge Clinton Hurd was sworn in Tuesday by County Clerk Walter B. Dillard.

Roosevelt Approves Huge Nat'l Budget

Washington, Dec. 30—President Roosevelt Friday night stamped final approval on the government's annual budget, estimated by officials to approximate \$8,800,000,000 for the 1939-40 fiscal year.

Although the document was guarded with the closest secrecy, it was learned that President Roosevelt expects 1939 to be a better business year, in that estimates of revenues from income and other taxes are higher by half a billion dollars.

Increase in the national defense budget by \$250,000,000 also was included although this was somewhat smaller than various amounts previously estimated. Of the increase, \$150,000,000 is for new warship construction.

In round numbers, big items in the budget are:

National defense — \$1,300,000,000.

Public debt costs — \$1,000,000,000.

Departmental — \$1,350,000,000.

Veterans bureau — \$550,000,000.

Farm relief — \$750,000,000.

Relief, recovery — \$1,500,000,000.

CCC camps — \$275,000,000.

Social security — \$350,000,000.

Youth Administration — \$200,000,000.

Public works, etc. — \$1,000,000,000.

The document, along with President Roosevelt's annual message on proposed expenditures and income, will be laid before both branches of congress next Thursday.
