Sprague Is 22nd Governor of Oregon

Salem, Oregon. — Charles A. Sprague became the 22nd governor of Oregon Monday amid impressive inaugural ceremonies held at the new \$2,500,000 state capitol in Salem.

Chief Justice John L. Rand of the Oregon supreme court administered the oath of office before a joint session of the house of representatives and senate in the new house chambers. Retiring Governor Charles H. Martin occupied the speaker's rostrum first. He outlined the four hectic years of his administration and pledged support to the future of the senate.

Governor Sprague addressed the assembly after being sworn in as the state's chief executive. He outlined a broad-sweeping program for his administration and lauded the work of ex-Governor Martin.

How to increase the income of the people and provide for its fair distribution was the keynote of Sprague's address.

"The first thing needed in this state is a restoration of confidence among business leaders," the governor declared. "Business men in all communities of our state must get a fresh grip on themselves and with new enthusiasm and courage take up the responsibility of forging prosperity without waiting for miracles from Washington or Wall street."

DUO PIANO ARTISTS TO APPEAR.

Eugene.—The noted duo-piano team of Pasmore and Trerice will open the winter portion of the University of Oregon's artist series Thursday evening, January 19, at McArthur court.

Pasmore and Trerice, since the inception of their careers as duo-pianists, have met with great enthusiasm from the public as well as musicians and critics. They recently have been on a nationwide concert tour which included several appearances in New York City.

The young artists, both in their middle twenties, appeared in Eugene two years ago on the summer concert series. They also have played with great success in Portland and other leading Pacific coast cities.

A feature of their Eugene appearance will be the first two-piano rendition of "Valse-Burlesque," an original composition by George Hopkins, noted pianist of the University of Oregon music school. A special arrangement for two pianos has been made by Hopkins for the concert.

Reserved and general admission tickets for the concert are now available at the Associated Student's office, McArthur court. Main orders will be filled upon receipt.
