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Safety Sonnets

Few indeed are the automobile drivers who realize how rapidly danger on the highway mounts with the setting sun.

It is true that two thirds of all property damage accidents occur during daylight hours, chiefly because traffic is so much heavier then, but statistics from every state in the union show that many more fatal accidents occur after dark than before. Here are the Oregon figures for the year 1937, from the files of Secretary of State Earl Snell.

All Accidents	Fatal
6 A. M. to 6 P. M.	25,085 143
6 P. M. to 6 A. M.	13,500 177

Probably the chief reason for the deadliness of the hours after dark is that motorists do not sufficiently decrease their speed to compensate for decreased visibility. Snell says. Dozens of accident studies and road tests have shown that 40 to 45 miles per hour is the maximum safe speed at which motorists can drive at night, with headlights and highway illumination in their present stage of development.

The reason for this is that the driver must be able to perceive danger and stop his car within the distance illuminated by his headlights if he is to avoid a collision under many circumstances. Driving at speeds which will not permit safe emergency stops at night is termed "overdriving one's headlights," and is practiced by many drivers who are not aware of its dangers.

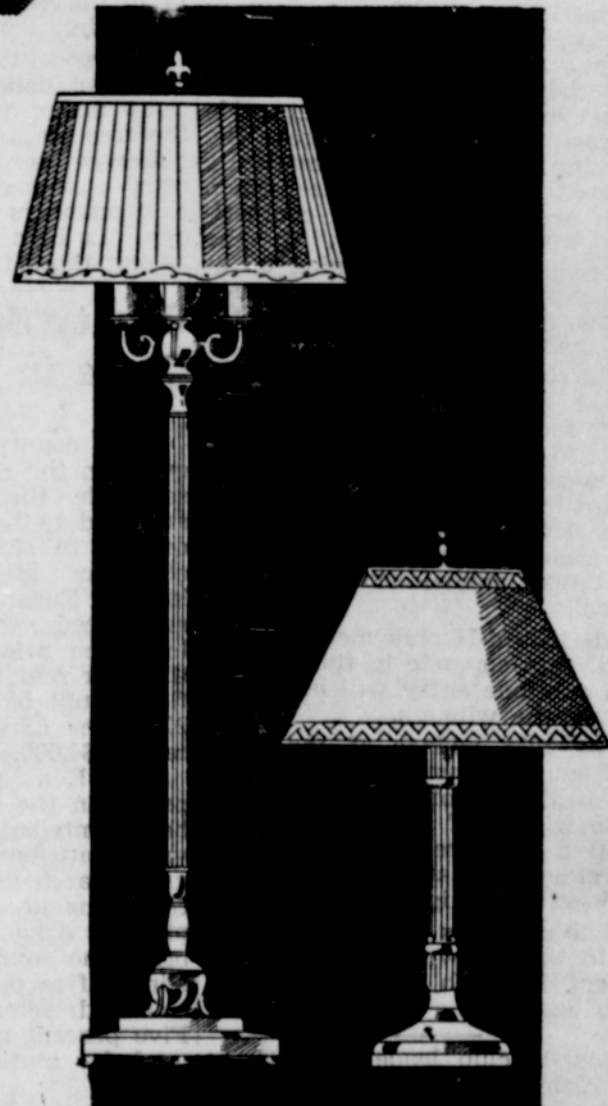
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
