

Farm Prices May Advance in 1939

A report from Washington, D. C., says: Administration leaders expressed the belief that 1939 would see an advance in farm prices and farmer purchasing power.

They based their opinion on a report of the bureau of agricultural economics that in December the general level of farm prices advanced almost two per cent while prices farmers pay for non-farm goods and services continued a decline started in July.

Back of the December price advance, farm officials said, were prospects that headway would be made next year in reducing price depressing agricultural surpluses and the expectation that consumer purchasing power would be better in 1939.

The type of products which show price improvement included such grains as wheat, corn, oats and barley, truck and fruit crops, and dairy products. Slight declines were reported for meat animals, cotton and poultry products.

Bill to Divert Gas Tax Withdrawn in State Legislature

Discouraged by adverse recommendations of Gov. Charles A. Sprague and Former Gov. Charles H. Martin and opposition of members of the highway committees of the house and senate, the League of Oregon Cities decided yesterday at Salem not to introduce its bill to divert \$880,000 of gasoline tax money to cities for the maintenance of streets.

Representatives of the league said they found members of the committees of both houses opposed to diversion.

A 10 per cent increase in liquor prices, which would raise \$1,250,000 for old age pensions during the 1939-40 biennium, would be provided in a bill prepared for introduction to the legislature today by Senator Rex Ellis of Pendleton.

Ellis said liquor sales during the past biennium totaled \$16,370,000. The 10 per cent increase would raise \$1,637,000, of which \$1,250,000 would be used for pensions.

Matched with federal funds, there would be \$2,500,000 available for pensions.

The remaining \$387,000 would be placed in the general fund to reduce property taxes.

"Tuesday we introduced a bill removing the pauper's oath. Today's bill will give the old folks more money," Ellis said.
