WPA CUT.

Washington.—President Roosevelt suffered reversal Tuesday in the first administration fight in the new congress when his requested \$875,000,000 for WPA relief was slashed to \$725,000,000 by a rebellious house appropriations sub-committee.

Revised and rewritten, the bill throws new restrictions around the use of the money by President Roosevelt and nullifies his executive order blanketing 32,300 WPA administration workers under civil service, which was to become effective February 1.
