GOLD OUTPUT UP.

WASHINGTON — The bureau of mines reported Monday Oregon produced more gold in 1938 than in any year since 1916.

The value of the gold, \$2,698,500, was the greatest since production started in 1852, due largely to the increased price of the metal, which now brings \$35 an ounce, compared with \$20.67 in years past.

Oregon's gold output in 1937, the bureau said, brought \$1,843,170.

Comparative values, 1938 and 1937, of other Oregon metals: Silver \$67,879 and \$46,846; copper \$9,016 and \$99,220; lead \$2,162 and \$12,862.
