Unemployment Law May Be Revised

Salem. — State Federation of Labor officials told Gov. Charles A. Sprague Saturday they doubted whether his proposed amendment of the state unemployment compensation law would influence the federal social security board to certify the law.

D. E. Nickerson, executive secretary of the federation; Kelley Loe, his assistant; and Chris Bosen, federation attorney, said repeal of the anti-picketing bill would be the only way for Oregon to have its law certified. Bosen adding "however, we won't try that because we know it can't be done."

Sprague said he would ask the legislature Monday to amend the unemployment law, hoping the amendment, prepared by Ralph Campbell, attorney for the unemployment compensation commission, would make certification possible.

The amendment would provide that no worker would have to accept a job vacated by a strike, lockout or other labor dispute, and would declare the state's policy to conform with the federal social security law. It would be retroactive to November 8, when the picketing initiative was passed by the voters.
