Will Extend Electric Lines to Serve About 75 Customers Soon

Plans have been made to extend power lines to serve more local people of the rural area, L. C. Schroeder, local manager of the Mountain States Power company, said here Saturday. A mile and a half extension is planned for the territory toward Dorena, making a power line of about five miles in length and serving thirty-five customers. A five mile extension is also planned for the Lorane section and work is expected to start as soon as all contracts have been signed by the customers. The Lorane extension will serve about forty customers.

Extension plans for the company is in line with its policy to make electricity available to all sections as rapidly as the demand justifies.

Lions at Top of League in Fourth Week of Contest

The Cottage Grove high school cagers, the dark horse of district 7, league basketball, are at the top of the league, tied with the University high of Eugene for first honors. The standing of the Grove team was computed at the end of the fourth week, after the locals had trimmed Junction City here Friday to the tune of 32 to 11. Van Lydegraf of Springfield is leading the league in scoring honors with 35 points, followed by Dugan and Blake of Cottage Grove with 21 and 21 points respectively. The Grove team also leads in points scored over opponents.

The Grove quintet scored an impressive 32 to 11 victory over Junction City here Friday night. Junction City, an untested team, was no match for the locals who took a commanding lead from the start and at the end of the first quarter had a ten to one advantage, however the second quarter was almost scoreless. Blake of the locals made the only point on a free throw. The locals made thirteen points in the third quarter and in the fourth quarter a number of substitutes saw action, in which Junction City made three field goals and two free throws.

The Grove second team also had easy sailing in winning from the Junction city second team 34 to 17.
