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News Briefs

The 21st Oregon press conference was ended at Eugene Saturday afternoon with election of officers. Harris Ellsworth of Roseburg was chosen as president and George Turnbull of Eugene with the University school of journalism was reelected secretary.

Alf M. Landon, 1936 republican nominee for president, issued a plea for a balanced national budget, speaking before the Kansas press association, saying that the present world affairs instead of being a justification for continued deficits is a mandate for a balanced budget.

Bananas were sold on the streets of Moscow, Russia, last week for the first time since the world war. Thousands of young people, who had never seen a banana, lingered to marvel at the exotic fruit. They stood in line to buy samples at 7 1/2 rubles a pound, about \$1.50 at the official exchange rate.

Herman S. Rone, 51, Broad-acre farmer, closed his own murder case Friday and cheated the gas chamber when he committed suicide by slashing his throat with a razor blade after confessing to killing his wife, Hershel McCarthy, another slayer, died in the new cyanide gas chamber Friday, being the first prisoner to die by gas in Oregon.

"They said it could not be done, but he did it." You have probably heard of this expression, said to be a true one. But a lot of people have reversed the motto, "It can't be done, so why not conserve your energy."

STILL A NEED.

Every week we hear of some south Lane county resident being rushed to a neighboring hospital, all of which brings to mind the need of a hospital here. Thousands of dollars are spent every year by this and adjoining communities for hospitalization that might as well be obtained here.

Old times tell us that Cottage Grove has been on the verge of getting a hospital several times, but something usually happens to the proposal. Much of the local work is of a hazardous nature and accidents are likely to happen most any time, all of which makes the need even greater.

The northwest is one of the leading sections of the nation so far as housing conditions go. And when we speak of housing conditions we take in the comfort of the homes, the modernization of the home, etc.

BENEFITS.

The year 1939 is the advent of two world fairs, one at San Francisco and one at New York. Regardless of what we believe is the permanent value of the tourist trade the northwest has a right to expect a considerable increase in tourist travel at the proper season, perhaps not from the New York world fair owing to the distance but from the San Francisco exposition, only a few hundred miles away.

Most states are going to considerable expense in advertising for the tourist trade believing that you can't sell people on a country unless they see it and as we view the situation it will pay this section of the country to spruce up a bit during the spring and summer months. Even though you don't have anything to sell it might make you feel better to improve the premises of your home, set your trees and shrubs in order and keep a green lawn during the summer months.

There is no argument but that this section needs more development and the way to get that development is to attract the investor.

DARK PICTURE FOR EUROPE.

In England and France observers find a growing belief that the Munich settlement was a tragic mistake. Even Mr. Chamberlain has lately taken a stronger tone toward Germany. And there is a sound reason for that: Trade.

Self-sufficiency is Hitler's dream—a Germany which can live in comfort and plenty without relying on any other power. And self-sufficiency is what Hitler is achieving with amazing speed. The small nations of Central Europe are coming more and more within the German orbit. Hitler uses any tools at his command to get the result he wants—promises, threats, economic bribes—and no small nation can afford to hold out against the desires of the "master of Europe." As Dewitt MacKenzie, an AP expert, writes, "The smashing of Czechoslovakia, and France's abdication of her influence, have enabled Hitler to impose a control under which these comparatively small countries henceforth will not live for themselves but for the benefit of the fatherland."

Thus does the balance of power shift. It means that billions in trade will be lost to other powers. It means that Hitler is gradually building a German-dominated empire exceeding even the dreams of Bismarck. And finally, it means that the outlook for Democracy in Europe was never blacker. Some experts feel it to be inevitable that France will eventually succumb, and become a totalitarian state more or less on the Fascist model.

AMERICAN SUPREMACY THREATENED.

Boake Carter recently said this: "No one tries to educate and to teach the great masses of people of this nation—including the vast slice of foreign-born in our midst—that it has been the system of competition and free enterprise that has been able to provide the fantastic picture of a man without a job blandly traveling to a WPA project behind the steering wheel of his own automobile!"

"How often is the fact sold to American citizens that were it not for these basic fundamentals we would not now be enjoying the freedom to talk, write, travel, produce or buy, that we possess?"

Americans have more radios, automobiles, refrigerators, and similar luxuries than any other people. They enjoy better food, and live in better homes. They wear better clothes and use better furniture. The ordinary citizen buys and employs for his pleasure and convenience commodities that can be possessed only by the rich of other lands.

As Mr. Carter observes, it is free competition, the backbone of private initiative and free enterprise, that has given us all this. In America, the man who can manufacture a product better or cheaper than another man has been at liberty to set up his factory, go to work, and get the business through honest competition. The man who can operate a store or a group of stores more efficiently and economically than another, and so give the consumer a better break, has been free to do it, and every one in the land has benefited as a result.

There are those who would pass laws to destroy efficiency in the interest of the inefficient. But once that is done, progress in America will be at an end—and our much vaunted world supremacy in the people's standard of living will be doomed.
