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MUST TURN TO IRRIGATION.

PORTLAND, ORE. — Western Oregon and Washington farmers must turn to irrigation if they expect to make their farms more profitable and take care of influx of settlers from the midwest, according to Arthur King, extension soils conservationist of Oregon State college.

Use of coastal streams for irrigation purposes is the single

large field for development of lands by private enterprise left to the western valleys of the Pacific northwest.

King, speaking before the Pacific northwest rural electrification conference, pointed out that development of arid lands east of the Cascades could only be made economical through government financing and a certain amount of subsidy.

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
