INTRODUCTIONS — Though they are every day occurrences are often the cause of confusion and embarrassment. ORDER OF INTRODUCTION: Since an introduction consists of presenting one person to another, custom requires certain standards be followed in presenting who to whom. The order is simple, and is based on courtesy and respect for age, sex and importance. The person to be honored always has others introduced to him or her.

A gentleman is always presented to a lady, except in cases of church dignitaries, the president of the United States, etc.

A younger person is presented to an older person of the same sex.

An unimportant person is presented to an important person.

An unmarried lady is presented to a married lady unless the unmarried lady is much older or an important person.

Young children are presented to adults of either sex.

Everyone is presented to your mother—regardless.

WHAT TO SAY. — The one standard though rather formal expression is "Miss X or Mrs. X—May I present Mr. R." It is also permissible to say "Mrs. X or Miss X—Mr. R." Mention first the name of the person to whom you are presenting the other person.

In group introductions, the hostess or a friend says: "I want to introduce Mr. R." Then proceeding around the group, the name of each person, male or female, is mentioned in consecutive order.

If a great many people are present, the newcomer is introduced only to the members of the nearest group unless there is some reason for them to be presented to everyone.

Acknowledgement — The acknowledgement, believe it or not—is "How do you do," spoken by both persons, with a smile and possibly a slight nod.
