Boy Scout Mothers Protest Article

Local Scout mothers have protested an article appearing in the Oregonian of Monday, in which a story appeared with reference to the organization of a Scout Mothers' club in the Beaumont district, believed to be the first in Oregon.

While the Cottage Grove club was not the first to be organized in the state, mothers of the Boy Scouts were organized here in 1937 and in December of the same year, mothers of the Girl Scouts were organized. There are two separate organizations, but the clubs meet together we understand and work together.

Because this week has been designated as Boy Scout Week in Cottage Grove, some of the projects undertaken by these clubs may be of interest:

The main project was completion of a concrete tennis court for all of the children and through the generous aid of Mr. and Mrs. Georg Bjorset they secured a cottage for a meeting place for the girls and also helped furnish it. They have stimulated attendance in the Boy Scout troop by offering patrol banners and providing feeds and treats for the boys; they sponsor each summer a picnic for both boys and girls and their families and have aided in local camps each year.
