Style Notes

The flowers that bloom in the spring . . . are no more gay or enchanting than the new shades in hosiery.

Since fashion decrees a season of high colors, hose are naturally keeping step. The trend is to lighter hose than in many seasons. There are high colors with a deep wine or mauve undertone to complement wine, fuchsia, purple, bright blue, green or black. Japonica, and the wide range from beige to browns are shown with neutral beige tones or the high color hose with sun tan and orange undertones. The hose may match the ensemble or high light it by direct contrast.

If you have any doubts about correct color combinations or wish to work out interesting color effects, consult the color charts put out by all the larger hosiery manufacturers.

Hints on Hosiery.

It is always economy to purchase two matching pairs of hose. In case of accident, the three hose will carry on.

Hose should be washed in luke warm water and mild soap after each wearing.

Roll the hose onto the leg. Never pull unnecessarily.

Runs and snags can be caught by nail enamel, and it will not wash out.

Large shops maintain a repair department where runs, snags and pulls are mended very successfully.

Some Do's and Don't's.

If you have lovely leg contours, it is your season. Highlight your ensemble with hose. The shades should be very light, the hose very sheer. Strive for contrast between the hose and hemline.

If you do not have perfect contours, the season is also kind to you. Highlight the ensemble by drawing the attention away from the ankle. Darker tones in hosiery will tend to slenderize. Hose that blend with the hemline will give a trim appearance. The dull and neutral tones are for you, where the hose must be in contrast to the ensemble. Do wear as sheer hose as your budget will permit.

Remember, hose should complement the ensemble and complement the ankle!

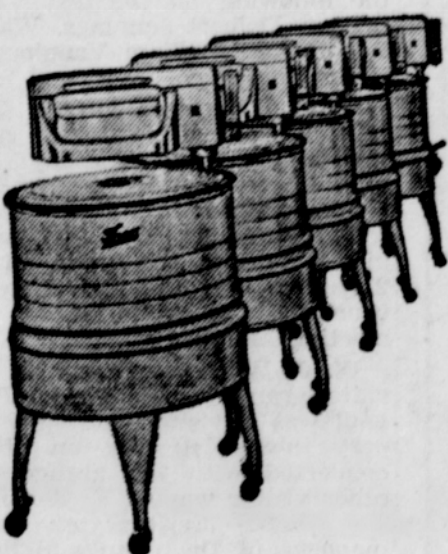
