ANIMAL BRANDS OWNED AS PERSONAL PROPERTY.

SALEM—Animal and poultry brands which have been officially recorded with the state department of agriculture may be sold, assigned or transferred from one individual to another in the same

manner as personal property, Dr. W. H. Lytle, chief of the department's animal industry division points out in clarifying recent inquiries from farmers.

Under the brand recording law, all brand transfers require a one dollar recording fee which may be sent to the department at the time of making the transfer.
