Wheat Planting Is Larger For 1939

WASHINGTON — The federal crop reporting board forecast at Washington Friday a 1939 wheat acreage of 65,678,000, compared with a 55,000,000-acre planting goal set up by the agricultural adjustment administration under the crop control law.

The board also estimated a national corn acreage of 92,062,000, compared with the AAA's goal of 96,000,000 acres. Estimates were based on reports from farmers on planting intentions.

Corn plantings compared with 101,714,000, the average of the last 10 years, and 93,257,000 last year, when the harvested acreage was 91,792,000 and production 2,542,238,000 bushels.

The all-spring wheat acreage was forecast at 19,505,000, compared with 23,515,000 acres sown last year and 22,393,000 acres averaged during the 1929-38 period. The board had previously reported 46,173,000 acres were planted to winter wheat last fall.

Dorena Class Studies Irrigation Equipment

The Dorena agricultural night class held its tenth and last meeting Saturday at 1 o'clock at which time an equipment demonstration was put on by W. H. Stout of Eugene. Water was pumped out of the Row river at the J. A. Schneider place and a number of different types of sprinklers were used in applying water to a pasture. Thirty-two were present at the meeting.

A discussion was led by H. C. Williamson, night class instructor, and many items relating to cost of installation, kind of crops to raise and kinds of power to use were taken up. Several different types of sprinklers were studied and the uses of each discussed. In the demonstration, 30 feet of suction pipe was used from the pump to the river and about 400 feet of main pipe to sprinkler heads. The methods of taking down and putting up the main pipes and sprinklers were demonstrated.

A number of people on farms in the Dorena district and the Delight Valley district contemplate installing irrigation equipment in the near future. Due to the nature of the land, the sprinkler system seems to be the best adapted to most conditions. Most of those interested in irrigating are going to raise Ladino clover for pasture or seed, alfalfa, berries or truck garden crops.

The past 10 weeks of night classes at Dorena has been very successful. A great deal of interest was manifested by all those attending and many problems were raised and discussed during each class. The average attendance per meeting was 20, the largest group attending any one meeting was 34. These agricultural night classes are put on in the fall or winter, each class consisting of 10 two hour night meetings. Mr. Williamson, agricultural instructor, has directed two such schools, the first at Lorane last fall and the second at the Dorena community.

Lumber Shipments Still Show Decline

The lumber movement from this section has not yet reached normal, due to the fact that several mills in the Culp Creek and Diss-ton areas have not finished changing the logging operations from rail to truck. For the period ending March 18th, lumber moved over the Southern Pacific totaled seventy-four cars as compared with eighty-five cars the previous week and seven cars of piling as compared with thirteen cars the previous week.

Shipments have been principally to southwestern points as weather conditions have hampered building in the midwest.
