BURMA MISSIONARY SPEAKS HERE

The Rev. Ernest Grigg, a retired missionary to Burma, gave a very interesting talk to a number of people at the First Baptist church Friday night. He told several interesting historical facts about the country. He said that in Burma, which is eleven hundred miles long and only five hundred and fifty miles wide at its widest point, there are thousands of apes, peacocks and elephants. Of the elephants, three thousand are trained to work. Many rubies are found there and also thousands of acres of teak forests. Much of our rice comes from that country as it is in a very wet climate where the annual rain fall is sometimes as much as fourteen feet.

Of the fourteen and one half million people in Burma, nine million are Buddhists but the Baptists alone have 1621 churches there and the Rev. Grigg says that it is a very promising coun-

try. He spent forty-five years there as a missionary, and, although retired, plans to return in October and carry on his work at his own expense.

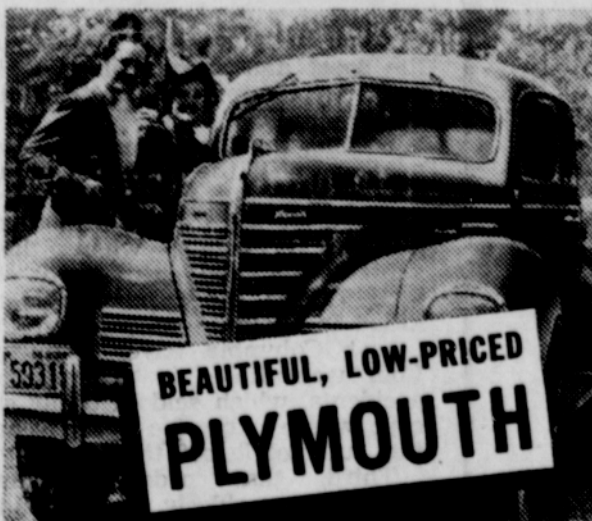
