Green Manure Crops May Be Plowed Under

Green manure crops may be plowed under and Canada thistles and wild morning glory may be controlled for payment under the 1939 agricultural conservation program, O. S. Fletcher, county agent, announced Monday.

Inspection prior to turning under the green manure crops is necessary in all cases and requests for inspection must be made through the office of the county agent, it is stated.

Barley, oats, rye, commercial mustard, rape, turnips, annual legumes, biennial legumes, mixtures of legumes and cheat are acceptable as green manure crops on crop land and on orchard land, providing a good stand and good growth is turned under after attaining at least two month's growth with no utilization for hay, grain, pasture, seed or canning purposes.

The requirements for Canada thistle and morning glory control are quite exacting and since prior inspection and approval are necessary, the co-operator is instructed to inform the county agent's office at an early date of the location and nature of the infestations he proposes to control in 1939 and request inspection. Detailed specifications for carrying out this practice are available.

Attention was also called to the fact that time for signing up new co-operators in the farm program was extended from January 15 to June 1. New farmers will have opportunity to cooperate if they so desire. Details concerning the signing up should be secured from Mr. Fletcher.

SENATE VOTES ARMY EXPANSION BILL.

Climaxing seven days of torrid debate over foreign policies, administration forces Tuesday at Washington rammed through the senate, 77 to 8, the \$358,000,000 army-expansion bill authorizing additions to the army's air power to provide a maximum of 6000 war planes.

The house had previously passed the measure but the senate, having tacked on several amendments, including one to limit profits of airplane manufacturers to 10 per cent on their government orders and putting a ceiling of \$300,000,000 in the authorization for aviation expansion, the bill now goes to conference between the senate and house.

Where the house had put a limit of 5,500 planes upon the army's air corps, the senate boosted this to 6000 after pleas of the war department that, with a larger authorization, a better-balanced air fleet could be provided.

HOG CHOLERA APPEARS IN TWO OREGON AREAS.

SALEM.—Two widely separated outbreaks of hog cholera have recently appeared in Oregon but now seem to be under control, according to Dr. W. H. Lytle, animal industry chief of the state department of agriculture.

State veterinarians report approximately 100 animals dead from the disease in the LaGrande-Union district, and nearly 40 in the area around Salem. It is thought that the eastern Oregon outbreak came about as a result of the illegal importation of infected Idaho hogs.

The outbreaks in the Salem area were confined to the farms in which garbage feeding was practiced. Too little cooking of the feeding stuff is held responsible for the deaths in that vicinity.

EWES WITH TWIN LAMBS NEED MORE GRAIN FEED

Twin lambs will make faster and more economical gains if the ewes are fed more grain with hay than is ordinarily the case, according to feeding tests conducted at the eastern Oregon livestock branch experiment station at Union.

When ewes with twin lambs were fed alfalfa hay without grain, they did not produce enough milk for the lambs, and these showed a stunted appearance. Twin lambs of ewes getting third cutting alfalfa hay and 1½ pounds of grain per day made an average daily gain of slightly over one-half pound each, which meant a production of one pound or lamb per day for each ewe, besides supporting the wool crop she was growing.

Third cutting alfalfa proved definitely superior to second cutting for feeding ewes. Ewes with single lambs did well on one-half pound of grain with hay.

"The rapid gains made by suckling lambs are cheap gains," says D. E. Richards, superintendent. "Considering feeds consumed and gains made, a pound of grain was put on a nursing lamb for about one-half the feed cost of putting a pound of gain on a 60 to 70 pound lot lamb."

CITIZEN'S MILITARY TRAINING CAMP.

"Word has been received that the Citizen's Military Training Camp will be held at Vancouver Barracks, Washington, this year during the period of July 1st to 30th. The Vancouver Barracks District is comprised of the State of Oregon and the counties of Clark, Cowlitz, Klickitat, Skamania and Wahkiakum of the state of Washington. The quota for this year has been tentatively set at 593.

The objects of these camps are to bring together young men of high type and thereby develop closer national and social unity; to teach the privileges, duties and responsibilities of American citizens; to stimulate patriotism; to interest young men in the importance of military training; to teach self-discipline and obedience, and to develop the physical standard of American youth through participation in military exercises, athletics, games and sports, conducted under expert directors.

Boys entering camp must be between the ages of 17 and 24 years, of average general intelligence, able to read and write, and be of good moral character.

Candidates desiring to enroll for the camp should send inquiry in the form of a letter, post card, telephone or personal call to the office of the CMTC officer, Headquarters Vancouver Barracks, Washington, or to the County Chairman, Military Training Camps Association of the county in which he resides as soon as practicable after April 1st."

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THE SOMBRERO MINE

A demonstration of irrigation equipment will be held at the gravel pit on the new Pacific highway 4½ miles northwest of Eugene city center at 1:30 p. m. on Thursday, April 6. All dealers selling irrigation equipment in Lane county are invited to demonstrate their pumps and distribution systems and a number have signified their intention of putting up demonstrations.

The demonstration has been arranged by County Agent O. S. Fletcher cooperating with Arthur King, extension soil conservationist, Oregon State College. Mr. Fletcher states that all interested people are invited to attend and that all people planning to install irrigation equipment or make changes in systems now in use should avail themselves of this opportunity to see a number of different lines of equipment in operation at the same time.
