TAX RIGHT UPHELD

WASHINGTON—The supreme court approved part of President Roosevelt's tax recommendations to congress Monday by holding a state can tax the income of an employee of a federal agency and the federal government can tax the income of a state employee.

The decision, on attempts by New York and Utah to tax the income of federal employees, was described by government attorneys as "one of the most momentous in many a year."

The court specifically overruled previous decisions holding the federal and state government could not tax the "means and instrumentalities" of the other.

ing to a report by Secretary of Labor Perkins, the construction of homes during February were two and a half times greater than in February, 1938, and twenty-one percent higher than January.
