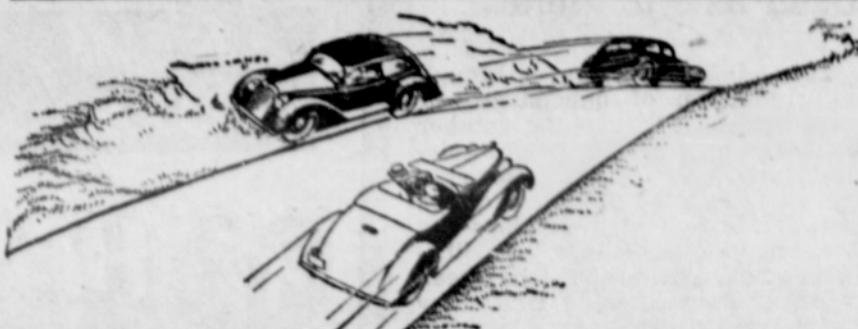

THREE HYBRID VARIETIES AGAIN BEST FIELD CORN

Oregon farmers planning to plant hybrid seed corn this season may obtain results of 1938 trials in a number of Oregon counties and at the Oregon State college experiment station by obtaining circular of information 199, from any extension office. The new circular is entitled "Yield Trials with Hybrid Field Corn" and is prepared by R. E. Fore, assistant agronomist at the experiment station.

The results from the 1938 yield trials were rather spotted because of the unusually dry season, but these trials again confirmed the superiority of certain hybrids and demonstrated their advantage over the old open pollinated corn for most purposes.

Three Wisconsin hybrids, No. 455, No. 525 and No. 570, are recommended to western Oregon growers. Seed of these hybrids is now available in the state. Several other hybrids proved particularly good in certain sections of the state and others showed promise but must be further tested before being recommended.

STUDENT RETURNS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON—After traveling from Potsdam, Germany, to the University of Oregon, last year, and thence to Japan, Werner Asendorf, former German exchange student, returned to the campus Sunday with an American wife, the former Signe Rasmussen of Portland.

Asendorf's travels have taken him nearly around the world in the last 18 months, but Dan Cupid's arrow missed him everywhere but in Oregon. The couple met here where they were both students of journalism. Mr. and Mrs. Asendorf are en route to New York, where the German youth will join the staff of DNB, the official German news agency.

Gardens Are Aid To Good Health

Well planned gardens help insure good health for farm families cooperating in the farm security administration live-at-home program in Lane county, reports Mrs. Dorothy Johnston, home management supervisor. Each family attempts to produce as much of the home vegetable supply on the farm as possible. After giving careful consideration to preferences of the family and the maximum vegetable requirements to provide an adequate year-round diet, the family garden is laid out to meet these specifications. Several plantings of different vegetables are made on the same ground by following early and quick growing crops with other plantings as soon as the first crop has been harvested. Provisions for some irrigation often doubles the output.

Many gardens are being planned with the aid of home economics extension bulletin No. 753, which is arranged by Miss Lucy Case, nutrition specialist at Oregon State college. This bulletin gives in a condensed form, the average amount to plant for one person, and after computing the needs of the entire family, it is clear how much space should be allotted for an adequate garden.

Gardens are planned to supply all fresh vegetables needed during summer months and provide enough additional produce to enable the homemaker to can not less than 26 to 30 quarts of tomatoes or juice and 30 to 40 quarts of vegetables for each member of the family, in addition to producing from 225 to 270 pounds of potatoes per person. Stored root crops and dried vegetables make a wide variety available for the planning of attractive meals during winter months when fresh vegetables are dear.
