Citizens Urged to Prepare for Clean-up Week in Cottage Grove

The following statement regarding Clean-up Week, issued by D. J. Allen, fire chief of the local fire department, should be of interest to every citizen.

"In the spring months cities and towns throughout the country begin their annual clean-up campaigns. This is the one time of the year when every individual and organization as well as the fire departments, cooperate in helping to increase the good appearance of the community and make it safer from fire.

"The annual clean-up for Cottage Grove will be next month. The purpose of this campaign for civic improvements are similar to those of fire prevention week. In addition it promotes health and sanitation, reduces accidents and stimulates local business.

"The majority of fires start in basements, attics, closets and similar places where rubbish and unnecessary accumulations of combustible materials are allowed to pile up. Rubbish may be the direct cause of fire by spontaneous ignition and all accumulations of combustible material favor the start of fire caused by matches, cigarettes, or any chance spark.

"Approximately fifty per cent of the loss of life by fire occurs in homes, and a study of 50,000 dwelling fires show that nearly fifty percent of them were caused by smoking or matches and rubbish.

The removal of rubbish and maintenance of general cleanliness should be a continuous activity. During the winter months, useless material accumulate and a spring clean-up is necessary.

"Fire departments take the lead in fire prevention and clean-up campaigns and getting other organizations interested and started in such work. The week set as clean-up week is observed by the fire department making special inspections of buildings, yards and lots to get people to remove fire hazards and make their property more attractive. In making an inspection of your own dwelling look for clothing which has been discarded and no longer used. The chances are that if old lamp shades, ladies old hats or other worn out clothing are sent to the basement or attic because the styles have changed, they will not be used again and should be thrown out or burned. Persons in their inspections should notice the hazards of wooden rubbish barrels and replace them with metal containers.

"Cleaning up rubbish and accumulations of combustibles is the largest single factor in fire prevention with spring clean-up week. Experience has demonstrated that a general campaign followed up with periodic and systematic inspections to eliminate and keep down all accumulations of material which favor the start of a fire in a community may greatly reduce its fire losses.

D. Caldwell Rites Are Held Sunday P. M.

Rites for Duncan Caldwell, aged 79, were held at the Mills chapel Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. with the Rev. H. W. Davis, Baptist pastor officiating. Mr. Caldwell died at his home here, 1004 South 4th street Friday evening at 9:00 p. m.

Born near Knoxville, Iowa, Mr. Caldwell was married to Miss Ruthie Lajoie at Eugene on September 5, 1900. He had lived here for the past forty years and operated a farm up until a few years ago. Surviving are his widow; two sons, Ernest P. Caldwell of Lebanon, and Lewis J. Caldwell of Cottage Grove; four daughters: Mrs. Vena Pentico of Cottage Grove; Mrs. Florence Willoughby of Cottage Grove; Mrs. Mary Jane Skelton of Lorane; Mrs. Claribel Dolman of Cottage Grove, and five grand children. Also two sisters, Mrs. Mary Smith of Walker and Mrs. Zelma Groom of Cottage Grove. Interment was made in the Masonic-I.O.O.F. cemetery.

Fat Lamb Show

Word has just been received from Mrs. R. Thompson, president of the Oregon Wool Growers auxiliary, that a special award of \$5.00 will be made to a 4-H club member exhibiting at the Junction City Fat Lamb show.

Rules under which the prize will be awarded will be on the following basis: This must be the first or second year exhibit; he must be interested in sheep and wool; he cannot be a high place winner at the show, but must have done a good job of fitting and showing; his clubmanship for the year must be good, which includes the attendance and participation in club activities; and the record book must be complete. The award is to be invested for the purpose of improving the winner's sheep project.

This is the first time this special award has been offered at any fat lamb show.

4-H Members to Enter in Farms and Home Accounting Projects

The national farm and home accounting activity sponsored by the International Harvester Co., under the supervision of the extension service and the national committee on boys and girls 4-H club work, has outlined a program for the farm and home accounting activities for 1939 and 1940.

The project is divided up into three phases—the keeping of a farm account for a year, the keeping of a home account for a year, and the keeping of a crop enterprise account on a crop which is the major enterprise on a farm. All records must be carried for a period of twelve consecutive months between December, 1938, and April 1st, 1940. Enterprise accounts must be kept for the production period.

A new system of awards has been inaugurated for this year, the Danish system of awards being used on each level of competition, county, state and national. Depending upon the quality of the records, blue, red and white awards will be made. \$4,350.00 in cash will be awarded to club members in this project with not more than one record in the excess of 15% in the competition shall receive blue awards and not more than 25% shall receive red awards at any level in the contest.

The objectives of the contest are to help club members obtain and manage an income, both money and non-money, which will contribute to better living, teach them the understanding of good business methods, help them to collect facts and use facts in the management of farm and home, and develop an understanding of the use of records as the basis of studying the factors which cause variations in farm earnings and family livings.

Eight older 4-H club members are now participating in the farm accounting activity phase, under the leadership of C. A. Horton. Club members who are interested in this project are requested to get in touch with the county club agent.
