Promotion of K. M. Chase to Atlantic Coast regional manager and appointment of F. Norman Phelps to the position of Pacific Coast regional manager, formerly held by Chase, was announced in Detroit this week by W. E. Holler, general sales manager of Chevrolet Motor Division.

Succeeding Mr. Phelps as assistant regional manager, with headquarters in Oakland, is S. M. Johnson, formerly Los Angeles zone manager.

Mr. Phelps is qualified for his important new post by reason of his long and outstanding record of successful operation with Chevrolet. In fourteen years with the organization, Phelps served as representative and as city sales manager, prior to his appointment, in 1933, to the post of Los Angeles zone manager. He left this post to fill the newly-created position of assistant regional manager in charge of used cars.

Mr. Johnson, who has been manager of the Los Angeles zone since March, 1937, will take over his new duties as assistant to Mr. Phelps immediately. 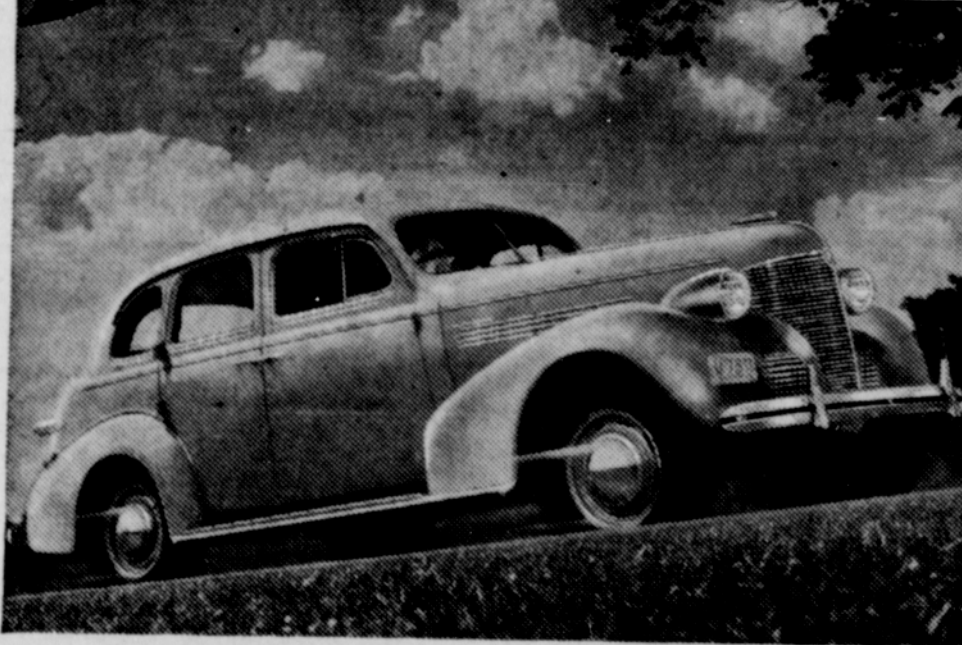
