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Accident Shows Education Need

The need of educating bicycle riders to take more precaution when riding on the streets where motor traffic is heaviest was forcibly brought to the mind of several by-standers Tuesday noon when two grade school lads, one riding the handle-bars of the bicycle, crashed into the side of an automobile at the intersection of Sixth and Main. The car was making a left-hand turn and was almost out of the intersection. Fortunately the bicycle struck the rear right wheel, throwing the boys back of the car. Had they collided with the front wheel instead of the rear one, there would have undoubtedly been serious injury to the boys, who, as it happened escaped with minor bruises. The motorist had full control of the car and stopped within a few feet after the accident.

Schools and the chief of police at the present time are devoting considerable time in teaching riders of bicycles the need of safety when riding on main traveled streets, and considerable interest is being taken by school pupils, but to break away from the method of riding bicycles some have used in the past will take some time and it is only hoped there will be no serious accidents until cyclists learn the rules of safe riding.

COURT HEARINGS

Hearing for Ed Jones, member of the local police force, was held in Eugene Justice court Monday. Jones, charged with being the father of an illegitimate child, supplied \$1,000 bail. The hearing will be continued later in the week. Lumber Shipments Fairly Steady Now

Lumber shipments from this district over the Southern Pacific continue at a steady clip, although loadings were twelve cars under the same period of last week and totaled an even 100 cars. Piling shipments are also about the same, four being loaded out last week.

Shipments were probably affected by market conditions which to date have not shown the improvement expected, but which are about in line with other major industries. And another factor is that production is conservative with normal and less than normal inventories.

Building and the demand for lumber is proceeding at a steady trend with the outlook greater when more favorable weather occurs in the midwest.
