A few of the Latin students gave a dramatization of a Latin and English poem. A French student read a few paragraphs of "Little Red Riding Hood."

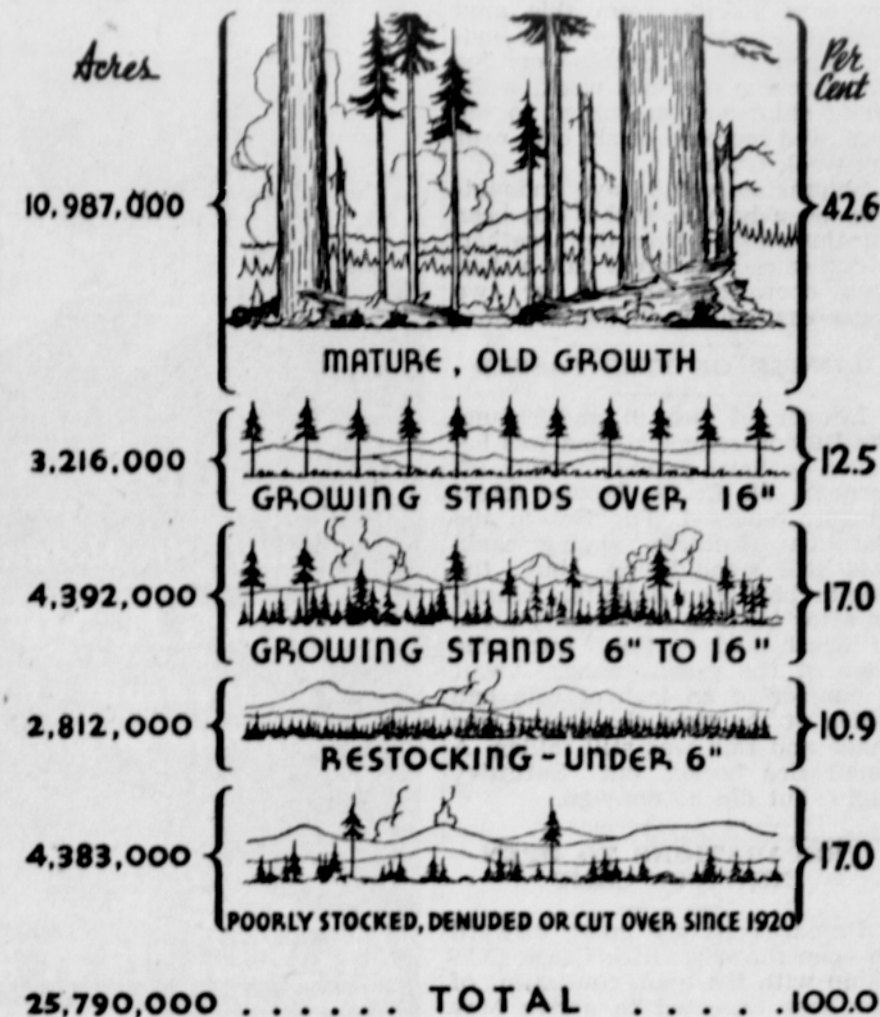
At the close of the assembly Shirley Hendricks gave a tap dance.

Classification Lumber in Douglas Fir Region of the Northwest

TIMBER TYPES in the DOUGLAS FIR REGION



This graphic representation of the classifications of timber growth in Western Oregon and Washington, and the acreage of each type, is from Timber Cropping in the Douglas Fir Region, a new publication of the joint committee on forest conservation of the West Coast Lumbermen's and Pacific Northwest loggers associations. The booklet was prepared in response to the joint resolution of the 75th congress providing for study of the forestry situation in the United States. An authoritative summary of the forest resources, forest practices, and forest needs of the Douglas fir region, it is nevertheless non-technical in treatment, and is simply written and profusely illustrated. The fact of major interest to the public, as illustrated in this picture graph, is that of the 25,790,000 acres of commercial forest land in the Douglas fir region, 10,987,000 acres, or 42.6 per cent, have stands of old growth—mature, overmature and dead timber. On the basis of present annual cut, this old-growth forest would last for 78 years. The growing stands of timber over 16 inches in diameter, on 12.5 per cent of the region's acreage, will be ready for harvest within 30 years. This new timber crop is already in partial use, as a source for poles, piling, ties, pulpwood, mine props and similar materials. "Timber is a crop—the harvest is homes."
