Mt. States Power Co. Submits Report

The annual report of Mountain States Power Company for the year 1938 covering its operations in six northwestern states has just been released from the main office of the company in Albany, Oregon, and contains much valuable information and is well worth reading. Some of its highlights are the following:

Ninety-one miles of rural lines constructed during the year.

Net additions to property during the year amounted to \$289,447.64.

Total number of customers served was 64,858 of which 6,777 reside on farms.

Operating revenues were \$4,244,876.24, after absorbing \$70,000 loss of revenue due to rate reductions.

Substantial rate reductions will be made throughout the company's properties in 1939.

Operating expenses, exclusive of taxes, were down .74% compared with 1937.

Taxes accrued (but not wholly paid in 1938) amounted to \$554,065.00 up 12.81% over 1937.

Taxes were equivalent to \$1,000 for each employee.

Taxes if applied equally were 70¢ per customer per month.

Taxes were equal to \$10 per share of preferred stock.

Average annual use of electricity per residential customer increased to 1247 which is approximately 50% more than the national average.

A new plan of company reorganization, not yet approved, was filed with the Securities and Exchange Commission on April 28, 1939, and provides substantially that preferred stockholders would receive one share of new 5% \$50 par value preferred stock, and two shares of no par common stock for each share of present preferred stock, and bondholders would receive new 5% bonds.

The report clearly indicates that the company is in a healthy financial condition and able to meet its obligations should the new plan be made effective.
