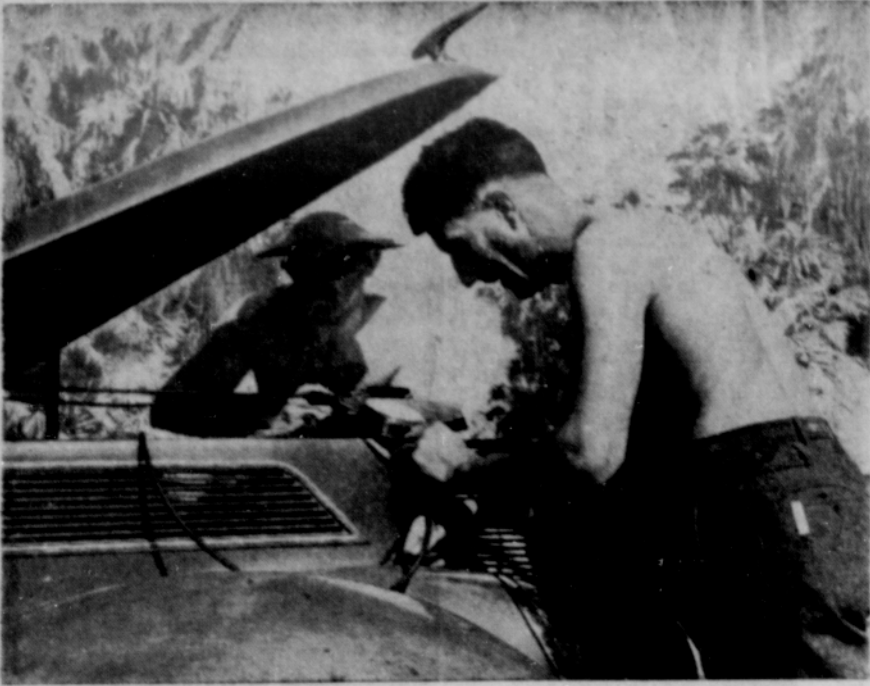


New Road Tests For Gasoline Made By Richfield Engineers



Here are two of the automotive engineers who for 65 days tested six popular gasolines along with ten new formulas developed in Richfield's new refinery. The best performing gasoline of the lot was number 8, one of the experimental fuels now offered to the public as Richfield All-Time Hi-Octane.

According to Richfield engineers one of the most exhaustive tests ever made of car and gasoline performance was completed over a period of 65 days in the Coachella Valley where 16 gasolines were tested in 92% of the types of cars on the road today. This research, according to its director, Larry Grunder, has anticipated former laboratory testing methods by proving a fuel's value in cars identical in type and condition to the motorists'.

According to Grunder laboratory tests on octane rating may not be at all indicative of a gasoline's road performance. He says: "We found some gasolines excel in city driving but fall short of perfection at high speeds; on others the reverse is true. Our research was directed towards a gasoline that performed equally well for city and highway driving. We found this in our test gasoline Number 8 which is now the New All-Time Hi-Octane."

Highway Backers Ask for Speed in Construction Work

Speed was urged in getting financial aid on the rebuilding of the Pacific highway at a meeting in Eugene Friday and attended by representatives from Medford, Grants Pass, Cottage Grove and other communities along the highway.

State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock was present and outlined a plan, which has been proposed to J. H. McDonald, chief of the federal bureau which provides: 1. Designation of certain existing highways as military and regional roads; 2. Federal funds to bring them to military standards; 3. Federal funds to buy right of way between communities and through and around cities and towns; 4. Large additional appropriation for these roads which will relieve the drain on other roads. The association has asked Henry Cabell of the state highway commission to take the lead in representing the state at Washington and will arrange to send other representatives if necessary. President Howard Merriman pointed out that the war department had already given its support of the program in making the highway an asset in a defense program.

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ENROLLMENT RECORD

An enrollment record for the several state institutions of higher education in Oregon is established for the year 1938-39, according to a summary just compiled by the chancellor's office. The grand total of 11,170 students in attendance during the year is a 9.56 per cent gain over 1937-38 and a 64.02 per cent gain over 1933-34, the low point during the depression.

Each of the six institutions shows a substantial increase over last year, and the University and State College student bodies are the largest in the history of the institutions.

Following are the final figures for each institution on the number of different students attending 1938-39: Oregon State college, 5072; University of Oregon, 3664; Oregon Normal school, 1017; Medical school, 558; Southern Oregon Normal school, 471; Eastern Oregon Normal school, 453.
