News Briefs

Sunday, May 28, is Rhododendron day at Florence and western Lane county is set to welcome hundreds of visitors. The flowers are out in profusion and are at their best now.

Bipartisan efforts to get congress adjourned by July 1, were underway last week at Washington. Influential leaders of both parties are said to be at work on a program that will permit adjournment before the dog days arrive.

Eugene will be hosts to the 18th annual convention of the Disabled American veterans of the World war and the 8th annual convention of the auxiliary of that group on June 11 to 14.

The war department stepped up its armament program Saturday with contracts for approximately 200 light bombing attack planes, considered by engineers to be the fastest in the world.

Six thousand pickers are needed to save Oregon's strawberry crop, Earl R. Lovell, manager of the state employment office at Portland said Saturday.

Tom Pendergast, former democratic boss of Kansas City, was fined \$10,000 and sent to federal prison for one year and three months. Sentence was passed by Judge Merrell E. Otis, after Pendergast pleaded guilty to income tax evasion.

Germany and Italy Monday signed a terse military pact, agreeing to pool their military and economic resources in the event of war in which either was involved. They also agreed to strike quickly and effectively in case of war. The pact was signed Monday and will be in effect for ten years and may be further extended by mutual agreement.

Salmon are reported running the McKenzie river, the first run was spotted last week by fishermen. Employees of the McKenzie hatchery are prepared to get their annual egg take.

Rites for Mrs. Martha Shortridge Sunday

Mrs. Martha Anna Shortridge, aged 73, a pioneer of this section, died in a Eugene hospital Friday. She was among the pioneers who moved to Oregon by wagon train and was born on the Platte river while her parents were enroute here and spent her life in this vicinity. Her husband died January 7th of this year.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon from the Mills chapel with the Rev. E. M. Patterson officiating. Interment was made in the Taylor Lane cemetery.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Murry Newton; two sons, Vern and Herbert Shortridge; three sisters, Mrs. Ella Wills, Mrs. W. T. Jones and Mrs. W. T. Small and three grand children, Patsy and Margaret Shortridge and Eathel Ann Newton, all of this community.
