

Construction on Union High Bldg. To Start Friday

Workmen Will Begin Pouring Concrete in Trenches Tomorrow.

TO BE FINISHED BY MID-YEAR.

After several false starts, construction on the new union high school is expected to get underway in earnest Friday morning, when a crew of workmen will commence pouring concrete in the trenches. A Sentinel representative yesterday was assured that "it's no fooling this time," but that work would start at the appointed hour.

J. H. Anderson and son, contractors, are on the ground now and C. N. Freeman of Portland, PWA architect, was down yesterday, checking over the final details.

All grading and excavation work has been completed. According to present plans, it is understood five or six workmen will start pouring concrete tomorrow and the crew will be built up to twenty-five or thirty by the first of the week. A full crew of fifty to sixty men will be employed once the work gets well underway.

A reliable source yesterday said that it would be mid-year before the new building would be completed and ready for occupancy.

Pomona Grange Wants Four Laws

Approximately 150 attended the meeting of the Lane Pomona grange at Eugene Saturday and went on record for four state and federal laws:

1. Support for the district public utilities program particularly for Lane as petitions are now in circulation.
2. Support for the farm loan program as now pending, but lower interest rates are sought.
3. Support of the present pending congressional bill on cost of farm production.
4. Support of a referendum that will place the Oregon primaries back in May instead of September as of a statute passed at the last session of the legislature.

Lumber Shipments 104 Cars Past Week

Lumber shipments from the district showed a slight drop and totaled 104 cars over the Southern Pacific as compared with 110 cars the previous week. Piling, however, moved more rapid. Sixteen cars were shipped out over the past week as compared to nine the previous period.

While lumber loadings continue steady they have not shown the expected pick up anticipated with the coming of spring. Shipments have been in widely scattered areas, but markets in some areas have not opened fully.

Short Illness Fatal To Mrs. J. Anderson

Mrs. J. H. Anderson, aged about 55, resident of Lynx Hollow, died this morning at 1:30 in a Eugene hospital from an intestinal obstruction. Mrs. Anderson was ill only about a week.

The Anderson family came here about a year ago from Pomona, California, where they had lived for several years. The body was brought to the Mills chapel home this morning and funeral arrangements are pending. A husband and two daughters, Dorothy and Mae, are among the survivors living here.

Hopes for Congress Adjournment July 15

WASHINGTON — A adjournment of congress on July 15 was the goal set yesterday by Democratic leaders at a conference with President Roosevelt at the White House on the legislative program.

A five-point program of "essential" measures was agreed upon. Speaker Bankhead and House Majority Leader Sam Rayburn announced. They are:

- Tax revision to aid business;
- Neutrality legislation;
- A \$1,750,000,000 relief bill;
- Railroad rehabilitation measures; and
- Social security act revision, to eliminate payroll tax increases and to speed up old-age pension payments.

Proposed changes in the Wagner labor relations act and the wage-hour law were omitted from the "must" list, but the leaders indicated the door was still open for action on them, provided committees in charge reported bills that could be enacted without difficulty.

Baccalaureate Services Are First Of the Commencement Activities

The baccalaureate services at the high school gymnasium Sunday evening marked the first of the commencement program activities for the graduating class of the Cottage Grove high school and also the farewell address of the Rev. J. A. Smith, retiring pastor of the First Presbyterian church, who is moving to Salem.

Taking for the basis of his remarks the 10th verse of the 6th chapter of Proverbs, the Rev. Smith extolled Daniel as one of the outstanding characters of the old testament and counseled the graduating class to follow the example set by Daniel for a full development of all phases of human activity and not to neglect the development of the spiritual side of human nature.

"Daniel," he said, "was a man who dared, a man unswerving in his opinion of right, a man who refused to permit success to turn him away from God. Daniel looked through the windows of his soul and saw God ruling the universe."

The speaker made reference to the responsibility facing the young people today and said, "We have made a sort of a mess of things, but we will soon turn our affairs over to you, expressing hope that with your knowledge and experience you will make a better world."

"Even though dictators rule many countries of the world and war clouds gather, God has not abdicated his throne nor turned the affairs of the universe over to any man or government," he said.

In closing the Rev. Smith admonished the class to seek all around development of self and not to neglect the spiritual side along with the physical and mental.

FOREST FIRE DANGER

Forest fire danger was described by forest officials as still high in western Oregon, despite the recent rains. Mountain snowdrifts have melted prematurely and the fall was not as heavy as usual. Twenty-one small fires have been stamped out in the Willamette and Siuslaw national forests, but little damage was done.

Tr. Paid to The Soldier Dead On Memorial Day

Program at Armory and at Bridge and Cemetery Is Given

PARADE IS MORE THAN BLOCK LONG

The soldier dead were honored here Tuesday in the annual Memorial day program in which eight service organizations participated. Despite the chilly weather the attendance at all services was very gratifying. Starting at 9:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, a program was held in the armory and concluded at the grave of the unknown soldier in the Masonic-I.O.O.F. cemetery.

The program, starting at the armory at 9:30 a. m., included the following numbers: Salute by the local Girl Scout troop; song, "America," by audience; opening of services by William Haldeman, commander of the local Legion Post; prayer, the Rev. E. F. Thayer; vocal duet, the Misses Betty Jones and Dorismae Blalock; address on the history and origin of Memorial Day by the Rev. E. L. Kechley; a vocal solo by Miss Pat Baldwin; song, "Star Spangled Banner," by the audience and the benediction by the Rev. Ellsworth Tilton closed the armory program.

After the armory program, six organizations, forming a parade over a block long, marched to the west Main bridge, where the navy dead were honored with an appropriate flower ceremony. Here the service ended with a prayer by the Rev. Ellsworth Tilton. Six organizations in the line of march and forming the parade included, the firing squad, the national guard, the auxiliaries of the American Legion and Spanish-American war veterans and the Women's Relief Corps.

At the Masonic-I.O.O.F. cemetery, tribute was paid to the unknown soldier with services and included a prayer by the Rev. E. L. Kechley, flag salute by the Boy Scouts, "Gettysburg Address" by Richard Smith and the placing of flowers at the monument of the unknown soldier by the Women's Relief Corps, the Auxiliaries of the Spanish-American War Veterans and the American Legion, the memorial address by the Rev. H. W. Davis and concluded with firing the salute and sounding of taps.

The service organizations participating extended thanks to the ministerial association for the cooperation in the program.

Pulp Wood Gains Lumber Decreases

Production, distribution and prices of forest products for more than forty years are summarized in a new booklet, "Forest Products Statistics of the Pacific Coast States," by the forest service, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Tabulations show that the state of Washington, with 535 mills in 1899, cut a total of 1½ billion board feet; with 656 mills in 1929 cut a total of 7½ billion board feet, and with 576 mills cut a total of 3½ billion board feet in 1935.

Oregon cut three-fourths billion board feet with 365 mills in 1899, 434 billion board feet with 588 mills in 1929, and 3 billion with 523 mills in 1935.

Total production from the Pacific coast states increased from 3 billion board feet in 1899 to 14 billion board feet in 1929 with a decline to 8 billion board feet in 1935.

Per capita lumber consumption in Oregon increased to a peak of 1231 board feet in 1926 then declined to 712 board feet in 1934. In Washington much the same trend is shown with a peak of 1108 board feet consumed per capita in 1928 with a decline to 592 board feet in 1934.

In Washington wood pulp production increased from 83,000 tons in 1919 to 900,000 tons in 1936; while in Oregon production increased from 84,000 tons in 1909 to 300,000 tons in 1936. Practically all of the pulp industry of the west is located in the Pacific coast states with more than two-thirds of the wood used being reduced in Washington.
