**500 Attend Fat  
Lamb Show Saturday**

An enthusiastic crowd of more than five hundred people watched the judging of the fattest lambs in this section of the country Saturday at the Junction City fat lamb show and the other high lights of the all day show.

A Shropshire lamb, exhibited by Walter Hill, was adjudged the fattest by the Judges O. M. Nelson and Al Oliver, both of Oregon State college. Hill, a resident of Junction City, was awarded a trophy by the Junction City Safety stores for the champion fat lamb.

A. H. Quimby and son of Halsey were awarded a trophy by A. R. Tracer Jewelry store for the best ram lamb. The ram, a Hampshire, topped a class of twenty individuals.

Scott Bailey, local F.F.A. boy, was awarded a trophy by A. R. Tracer Jewelry store for the champion fleece. He topped his own class of medium wools and then won the championship from his father, Ash Bailey, who had placed first in the long wool class.

The show was sponsored by the Junction City Lions club with the cooperation of the merchants of Junction City and the Lane County Court. Entries in the contests came from all over Lane, Linn and Benton counties with farmers, 4-H club members and Future Farmers of America participating and exhibiting a total of 158 lambs.

Dr. J. N. Shaw and O. M. Nelson, both of Oregon State college, gave talks on different phases of sheep raising. Al Oliver, assistant professor of animal husbandry, gave a demonstration of cutting up a lamb carcass and the pieces were given away to the people in the audience who held the lucky numbers.

Two other points of interest in the show were the sheep shearing contest and the dog working trials. All entries in the sheep shearing contest were from Junction City with Malcolm Harper winning first; Ben Kokkler, second, and Robert Harper, third. The dog working trials were quite a different story with entries from Turner and all points this side with eleven dogs entered. Ray Frum of Brownsville took the top honors with Edward Gath, Turner, second, and Earl McKinney of Lebanon, third.

Vernon Flanagan of Junction City won first in the 4-H club fat lamb class and in the 4-H club showmanship contest, George Sertic, Veneta, placed first in the 4-H club pen of three fat lambs.

A. H. Quimby and son of Halsey placed first on the single fat lamb in the long wool class. W. P. Hubbard, Monroe, placed first in the medium wool pen.

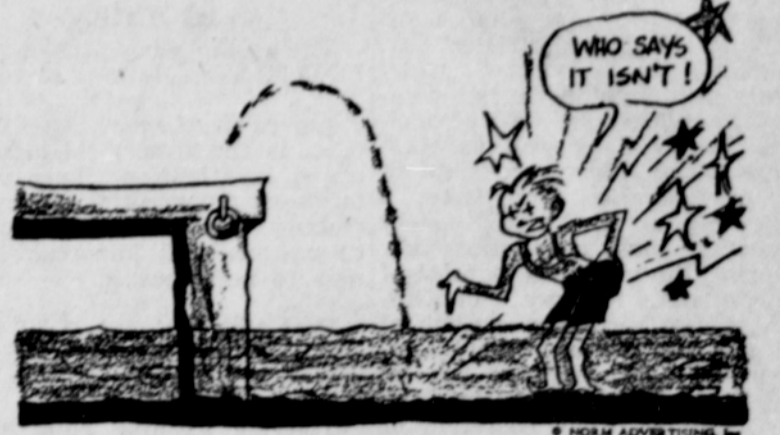
