### HOW TO MAKE MARASCHINO CHERRIES AT HOME TOLD

Cherry season 'always brings many requests for information on how to make maraschino cherries in small quantities at home. The food products department at Oregon State college, which pioneered in commercial methods of making maraschino cherries, has recently issued a circular of information which tells how to modify the large scale commercial methods and apply them to gallon lots of pitted cherries.

Preparing maraschino cherries involves bleaching, stemming and pitting, leeching, dyeing, applying the syrup and the desired flavor. Although dyed cherries are generally flavored with imitation maraschino flavor, other kinds may be used, such as almond extract, rose, lemon, or grenadine. The bleached cherries are also sometimes dyed green and then flavored with mint.

The circular No. 198 also contains detailed instructions, and addresses of places where dyes and other materials may be purchased.

## Biggest Senior Class Gets 691 Degrees at OSC

OREGON STATE COLLEGE.—The seventieth and largest annual commencement here Monday, May 29, sent 691 men and women out to "commence" their life work. Most of them had permanent positions already arranged, a recent survey showed, others have summer work lined up, some of the women will go directly into homemaking or other non-commercial fields, while not a few graduates will continue in advanced study.

Included in this largest of all OSC graduating classes were the following from Cottage Grove: Jack Kelly, Harold Mackin, Faye Hill Stewart. From Elkton: Richard E. DeCamp. Yoncalla: Marvin LeRoy Helland, Olger Gunnar Helland, Lucille Huntington and Kenneth Toner.

Degrees conferred this year included 5 honorary degrees, 3 doctors of philosophy, the highest earned degree; 4 professional degrees, 8 masters of arts, 66 masters of science, 3 masters of education, 2 masters of forestry, 26 bachelors of arts and 574 bachelors of science.

The school of agriculture led in numbers of graduates with 130. Engineering, which led last year, was second with 106, followed by home economics, 96; forestry, 71; science, 64; education, 58; secretarial science, 55; pharmacy, 16, and nursing education, 4.

Geographically the graduates this year came from every Oregon county, 13 other states and five foreign countries. California had the most out-of-state graduates with 42, while China led the foreign countries with 3.

Average age of those finishing the regular four-year courses was 23.73, girls averaging 23.27 and men 23.92. Elizabeth Cornelia Parsons of Burlingame, California, was the youngest graduate, having become 20 years old only last January. Arlie Laurence Hatfield, Corvallis, was youngest man, born 20 years ago last November.

### COMMITTEE MEETS

The county agriculture committee met in Eugene Monday with County Agent O. S. Fletcher and went over some of the 1939 farm work sheets. Farmers who have not yet handed in their sheets are urged to do so at once.

Sixty additional checks total \$2,594.24 was received in the office of County Agent Fletcher Saturday, for county farmers complying with the 1938 farm program. A total of 256 checks, aggregating slightly over \$8,500 has been received to date on the 1938 program.
