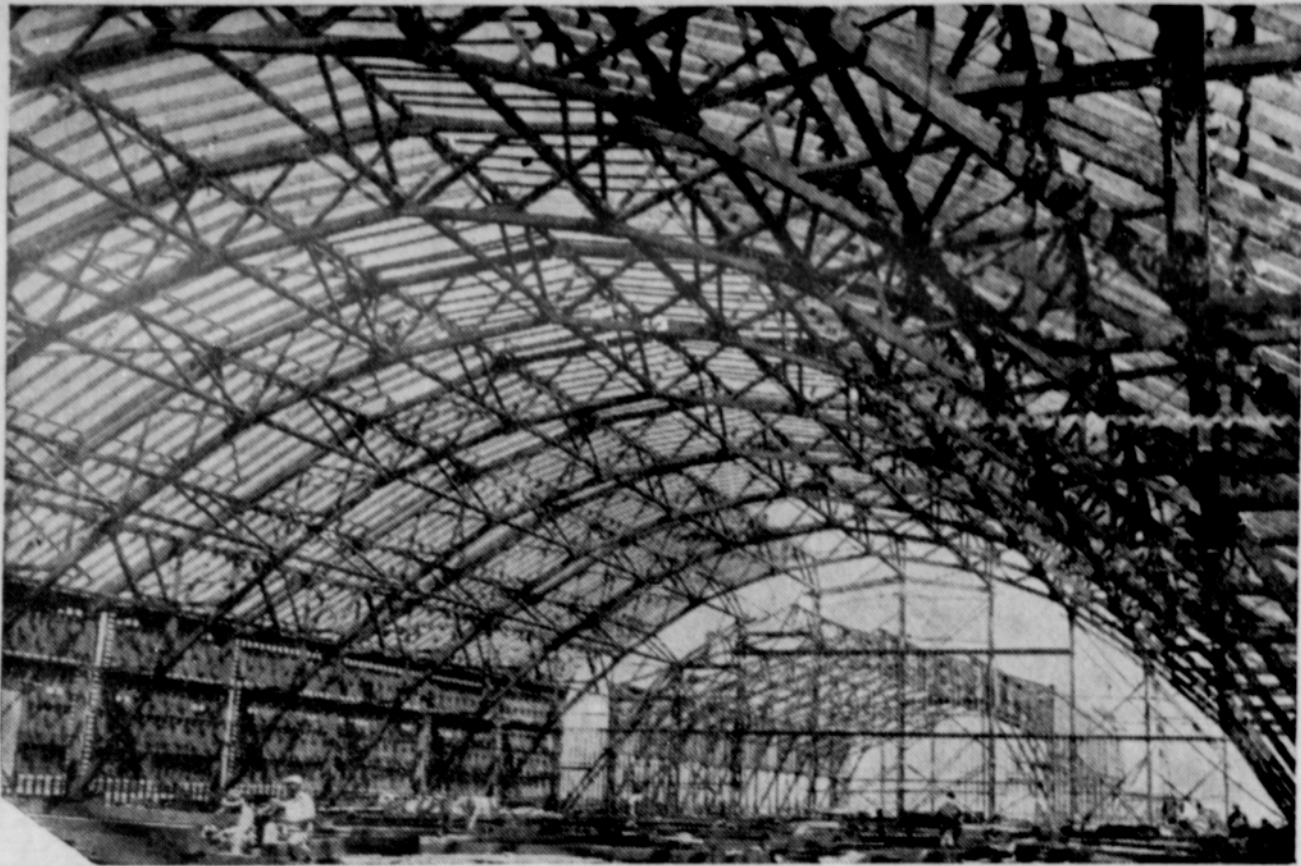


Giant Douglas Fir Trusses at San Francisco Exposition



According to the loggers, the great woodsman, Paul Bunyan, had a pet spider—susie was her name—who could spin out strands big and tough enough for log skidding. Susie's ambition was to spin from horn to horn of Babe the Blue Ox, and once she almost made it—that time she had only 117 feet to go when she "ran out of rope." Like the webs woven by Paul's prodigious spider are the Douglas fir roof trusses of the exhibit palaces of the San Francisco World's Fair. In the Transportation Palace, through modern timber engineering design, the trusses have a clear span of 200 feet. Over 2,000 carloads of Douglas fir and West Coast hemlock from Oregon and Washington were used in the building of the Exposition. The Treasure Island palaces present an outstanding demonstration of the values of Douglas fir and West Coast hemlock flooring in modern architectural designing and structural engineering. The West Coast Lumbermen's association predicts that this demonstration will lead to wider use of timber from Washington and Oregon for heavy construction, and hence to an increase of business and payrolls of the two states through greater production by the region's major industry—lumbering.

Strawberry Festival
Date June 2-3

LEBANON, May 30. (Special)—Lebanon, the Strawberry City, completed its plans today for its 30th annual Strawberry Festival, an event of next Friday and Saturday, to which it is issuing cordial invitation to Cottage Grove and surrounding communities to attend. Featured by free, generous helpings of the world's largest strawberry shortcake on Friday, and by the addresses of prominent individuals and a mass band demonstration the concluding day, this year's festival offers a host of new attractions in addition to the old which have attracted crowds of more than 15,000 people annually since the fair was founded 30 years ago. A tri-county baseball tourney will be in play both days.

The two-ton shortcake, liberally heaped with fresh luscious berries, will be served shortly after the mammoth parade concludes at noon.

Among the speakers are J. D. Swensen, head of the Portland office of the Department of Justice, and Dr. Wayne Morse, Dean of School of Law, U. of O., recently appointed labor arbitrator. Another notable to be present is Edward Everett Horton, popular comedian of the stage, radio and screen.

Eight bands will take part in the mass demonstration on the high school athletic field on Saturday evening, followed by fire works. Programs of a wide variety will be offered each afternoon.

Other features include a kiddies parade Saturday morning, the Browning carnival, educational and art exhibits, and a flower show.

Over all will rule Evelyn Mick as queen, and her court of eight princesses, to be ordained to their stations in coronation ceremonies Thursday evening in the high school auditorium.

RUSSIA REFUSES

Russia's refusal to aid Britain and France in case of war yesterday came as a blow to these powers. Premier-Foreign Minister Molotoff yesterday rejected as inadequate the latest British-French mutual aid pact proposal, but left the door slightly ajar in the event the two powers meet Moscow's proposition. He said in effect that Britain and France wanted to build a bloc of nations insufficient and ineffective and said: "It is impossible to think now that they want to end aggression."

Molotoff also made it clear that Russia was not rejecting in advance any efforts by Berlin toward a more normal relationship. Trade relations with Germany may be resumed, he said.

He outlined Russia's position in a speech on foreign affairs to the supreme soviet or parliament. He said Russia must be vigilant and remember Joseph Stalin's warning about "pulling chestnuts out of the fire." He said Russia would defend the frontiers of outer Mongolia as "firmly as our own." The Mongolia warning was directed at Japan.
