## UP TO US.

Regardless of what may be your personal opinion as to the relative value of the Willamette flood control project, it appears now that the project is practically assured and further that it is up to each individual community to "write their own ticket" so far as permanent benefits are concerned. That all will benefit during the construction period, estimated from three to five years, is generally conceded, but whether we shall avail ourselves of the irrigation possibilities or of the power possibilities if there are any, will rest with us.

The first step in the creation of irrigation is the setting up of a reclamation project, because the dams are to be constructed primarily for flood control. And while we are not so favorably situated as residents of the lower valley, it is possible to irrigate quite a bit of land in this trade area.

This possibility should not be overlooked.

## TRIED AND FOUND WANTING

A short time ago President Green of the American Federation of Labor, requested that Congress amend the Wagner Labor Relations Act at this session. Failure to do that, he added, might mean "obliteration of the act in 1940."

In other words, if the Wagner Act isn't soon amended to correct its abuses and weaknesses, a disgusted people will see to it that it is voted into oblivion. And if that happens, the good portions of the act, which properly protect the worker in his rights, will go, as well as those bad portions which encourage labor racketeering.

The Wagner Act has been tried, and found wanting. The best friends labor has, call for its revision. Those wise voices should be given the immediate hearing they deserve.

## DATE OF STATE PRIMARY

Voters will soon have opportunity to express their preference as to whether they would like to have a state primary in May or September. The question of course will never be settled to the satisfaction of every one. Candidates generally favor a short campaign on account of the expense and effort involved. Long campaigns are usually expensive and often grow tiresome.

Those who favor the May primary contend that the short campaign works a hardship on the candidate with limited funds, since it is practically impossible to make a thorough canvass.

## MAY PLACEMENTS HIGHER

SALEM—May placements reported by the Oregon State Employment Service soared above any monthly total recorded during 1938, comparison of records at the administrative office here revealed.

A total of 5,864 regular placements were recorded and in addition there were 4,514 casuals put to work for temporary periods. The active file dropped to a new low of 55,976.

Seventy-five per cent of the regular placements were in private industry. This was one of the highest percentages recorded anywhere, according to Acting Director L. C. Stoll.

Berry season and a general opening up of agricultural pursuits augmenting an intensive campaign to put able and available Oregonians back to work accounted for the record placements, officials said.

Lane county accounted for 391 or 6.7 per cent of the state total placements.

## An Elephant Cemetery

What is believed to be an "elephant cemetery," established by Hannibal, the Carthaginian general, when he slaughtered some of his war beasts before crossing the Alps, is situated near Avacon, in the valley of the Durance, France. Beneath the "cemetery" was the burial place of a chieftain of the Iron age and 100 of his warriors who died 800 years before Hannibal led his army from Spain over the Alpine passes. In 218 B. C. Hannibal started from Carthage with 37 elephants and 102,000 Moors and Spaniards. Only a few men and beasts reached Italy.

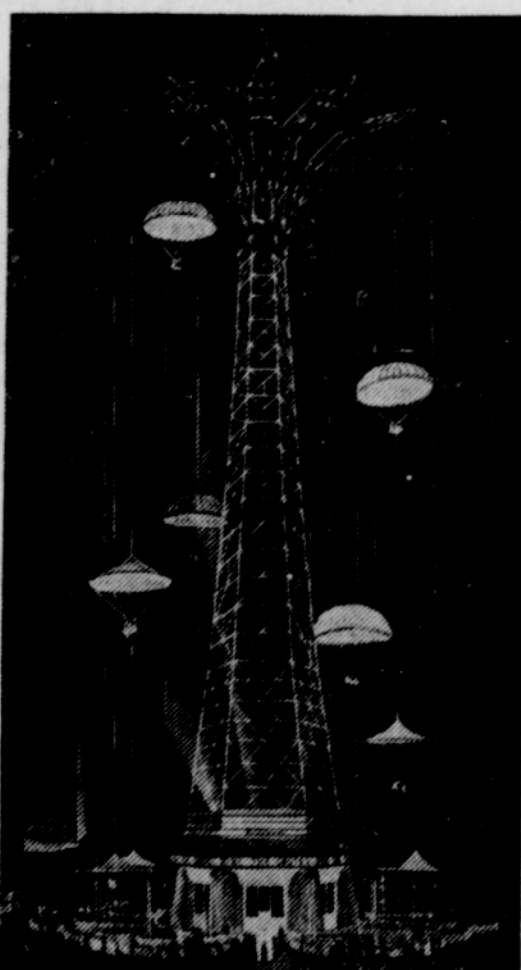

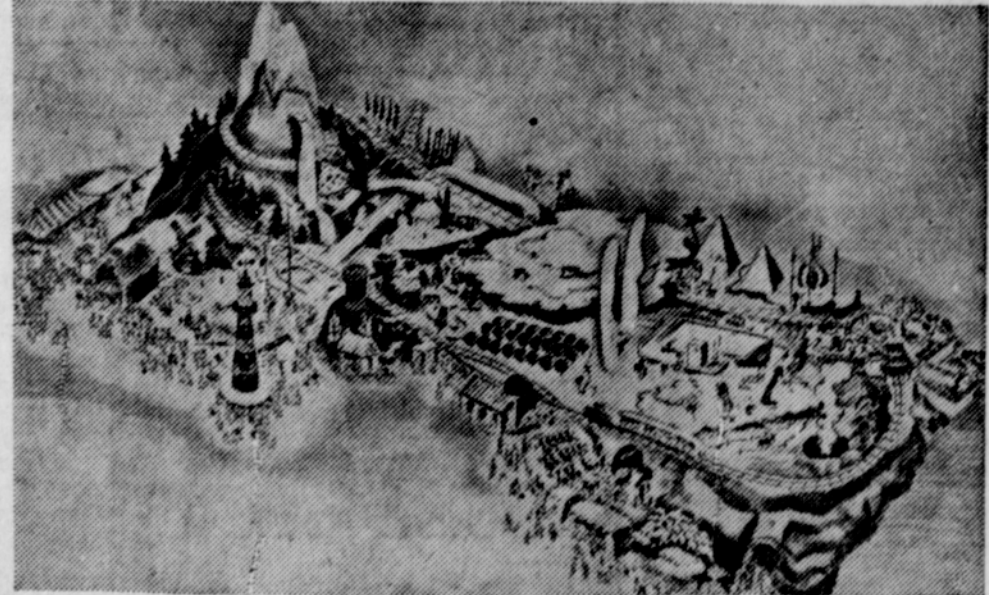
