GRAND COULEE PAYROLL CUT; 680 LOSE JOBS

GRAND COULEE, Wash.—The payroll of Grand Coulee dam was further reduced Monday as more men were discharged. During the last 30 days 680 men were laid off, nearly 200 in the last week. Reclamation bureau officials said that there would be a steady decrease in the number of persons employed at the damsite until completion of the project. Work on the actual dam itself was proceeding slowly, due to a cement shortage, with 12,000 cubic yards of concrete being poured each day.
