Z. E. Merrill Issues Statement Regarding Reorganization Plan

Z. E. Merrill, president of the Mountain States Power company, issued the following statement in connection with the recent approval by the Federal Securities and Exchange Commission of the plan of reorganization of that company:

Naturally, I am pleased that the Federal Securities and Exchange Commission, an agency charged with protecting the interest of investors in public utility securities, has approved the plan of reorganization of Mountain States Power Company as fair and equitable to the preferred stockholders and to all classes of security holders of said Company. The plan approved by the Commission was originally filed in approximately its present form, jointly, by the Company and the committee representing the preferred stockholders. The Company, in these proceedings, is in effect acting as a trustee under the direction of the Federal Court and as such trustee must give careful consideration to the rights of all classes of its investors and is also charged with the responsibility of contesting the claims of all creditors whose claims can be justifiably questioned.

The present plan of reorganization provides that new bonds shall be issued to present bondholders in exchange for their

present 6 percent and 5 percent bonds. It also provides that present preferred stockholders will receive one share of new \$50.00 par value 5% preferred stock and also two shares of new no-par common stock in exchange for each share of present preferred stock. Present common stockholders are given a small amount of new common stock on a basis of one share of new common stock for 20 shares of present common.

New common stock is given to Standard Gas & Electric Company in settlement of its claim against Mountain States Power Company, which claim was contested by both the Company and the preferred stockholders' committee and reduced by approximately \$4,100,000.

Sixty CCC Enrollees To Be Replaced

Approximately sixty enrollees of the Brice Creek CCC camp will be replaced shortly as this number has served the allotted time and left for their homes. Monday twenty-seven boys left for their homes in Georgia and North Carolina and seven for Alabama. New enrollees are expected to arrive here about July 1st or shortly thereafter to bring the camp to full strength of 200.

HOPES FOR LABOR PEACE

Hopes for peace between the two warring labor groups, the C.I.O. and the A.F. of L. have not been abandoned by the administration. President Roosevelt believes that peace will be eventually restored between the two groups thus ending a three-year-old war and uniting 8,000,000 laborers.

Flood Control Bill Sent to President

The senate yesterday passed the \$305,000,000 appropriation bill and the measure now goes to the White House for the signature of President Roosevelt.

President Roosevelt is expected to sign the non-military appropriation for the war department this week. The bill carrying \$305,000,000 appropriation includes \$172,000,000 for flood control and approximately \$6,000,000 for the Willamette valley project. The record breaking appropriation is the biggest flood project ever launched by the nation.

House action on bill was completed Tuesday as the senate commerce committee approved the rivers and harbors measure authorizing \$407,855,600 and except for a minor amendment to be concurred by the senate congressional action was completed.
