Farm Allotments For 1940 Wheat To Go Out Soon

Wheat growers of Oregon will receive notification of allotments for 1940 within a very short time, it appeared this week with announcement from the state AAA office at OSC that county allotments have been sent out.

Oregon's wheat allotment for 1940 is 851,458 acres, an increase of 10 per cent over 1939. This increase is being carried out in the county allotments, and will be reflected in allotments given individual farms.

Farmers are under no compulsion to comply with wheat allotments set for their farms, since the program is entirely voluntary, it is pointed out by Will Steen of Milton, chairman of the state agricultural conservation committee.

"The allotments represent planting goals," Steen explained. "We know that during recent years we have been growing more wheat than we could use. Farmers who cooperate with the AAA program and plant only the amount of their allotment help balance the nation's wheat supply with the demand. They help stabilize the price of wheat, thus guaranteeing themselves a better income."

County conservation committees are now receiving instruction from state AAA office representatives in methods to be used in apportioning 1940 county allotments to individual farms. The instruction meetings are being held in all of the wheat-growing counties.

Oregon wheat growers who participated in the 1939 program have already received close to one million dollars in parity payments, a summary at the state office shows. Such price adjustment payments are being made to all farmers who held their wheat acreage within their allotments.

The latest summary showed \$973,276 paid on 2227 applications. It is estimated that the total of such payments this year will amount to about \$1,400,000.

President Defeated In Currency Bill

WASHINGTON — Without a record vote, the senate Monday approved the monetary bill after voting to strip President Roosevelt of his dollar-devaluation power, raising the price of domestically-mined silver from 64.64 cents to 77.7557 cents an ounce and banning further government purchases of foreign-mined white metal.

These three changes in the house-approval measure dealt the administration one of the most telling blows it has experienced since Mr. Roosevelt's tenure began.

As finally approved, the bill continues, from Friday next to June 30, 1941, operation of the \$2,000,000,000 exchange stabilization fund, which is employed to maintain the American dollar stable in international monetary markets.

The measure went back to the house which had passed it in practically the exact form the president desired. Defeated at every turn in the upper branch Monday, the administration began at once a desperate drive to induce the house to restore the bill to its original form.

OREGON DOMINATES BENT GRASS MARKET

Oregon produces more than 90 per cent of the commercial bent grass seed annually in the United States, according to figures compiled by the Oregon State college extension service.

Imports of seed from other countries have been virtually halted by a protective tariff giving Oregon a near monopoly on the market for the entire country. Under the supervision of G. R. Hyslop, head of the plant in-

dustries division, a seed certification service has been developed which gives Oregon seed an accredited place on the market. Close to a half-million pounds of seed were produced in 11 western Oregon counties in 1938 against 56,000 pounds in the early days of the industry in 1926.

The bent grass straw is not wasted after the seed is harvested, as it makes excellent hay.

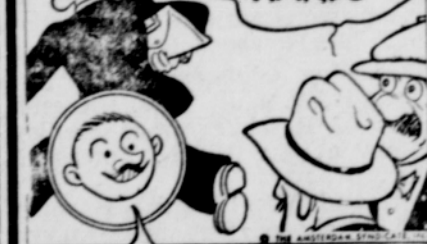
